My Lord,

M0/6630/9 I have the honour to refer to Your Lordship's Cypher telegram of the 26th of November 1919, regarding the scale of salaries to be offered for male postal clerks and telegraphists and second class telegraph inspectors, and to my telegraphic reply No. 899 of the 4th of December 1919 in which I intimated that a despatch would follow.

2. Soon after my telegram was despatched information was received of the increase of war bonus to Civil servants in England from 20th to 30 p-r cent. In view of this and the possibility of further increase being conceded at home, and also of the uncertainty regarding the future rupee basis of local payment of sterling salaries and the extent and terms of the general salary revision now under consideration it has not been possible to put forward any definite scheme.

On the one hand a sufficient inducement for trained officials to join this service must be provided: on the other care has to be taken to keep the Protectorate Post Office salaries proportionate to those of officers of equal rank in other Departments here and to Post Office salaries in England and elsewhere: in this connection also care has to be taken to avoid causing dissatisfaction among the present Post Office Staff by increasing the emoluments of new recruits in advance of the adjustment of existing salaries.

3. The Postmaster General has dealt with this question in a memorandum which I forwarded to Your Lordship under cover of my despatch No.385 of the 20th instant, but his recommendations are necessarily tentative in view of the considerations mentioned. Meanwhile, the position is becoming acute, owing to the influx of settlers and the reduction of the available trained personnel due to the necessity of granting leave in certain cases. Of the thirty male postal clerks and telegraphists asked for in my telegram No.1332 of the 5th of December 1918 and Sir Edward Northey's despatch No.480 of the 2nd of May 1919 only four have arrived, and the position regarding other rates of staff asked for is, relatively, no better. Apart from the difficulties to which these conditions give rise there is a disposition on the part of a certain section of the staff (particularly the male telegraphists) to exploit the situation in a manner

manner which does not make for efficiency. Moreover I am advised that such relief as was afforded by the obtaining of five telegraphists on loan from South Africa has been largely neutralised by the attitude of the men so recruited in that they have imported something of the Labour attitude of the Union regarding the employment of Africans and Asiatics in what are there considered "white avocations".

4. The Postmaster General informs me that so far as the public are concerned, and particularly the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce which has formerly been the most prominent in complaints of Post Office inefficiency, he has hitherto been able to obtain a more reasonable attitude of recognition of existing difficulties, in securing which the recent reduction of cable rates and certain additional facilities at Nairobi have been an important factor. He points out however that the patience of both the staff and the public is now becoming exhausted and that serious difficulties must arise unless further telegraphists arrive by the end of July at latest.

5. In all the circumstances detailed above I would urge that some scale of salaries be immediately decided upon in England, sufficiently liberal to obtain the staff required. It is thought that £250 by £15 to £300, supplemented if necessary by suitable War Bonus, should meet the case of telegraphists and telegraph inspectors --- the two classes of personnel most urgently required.
