Supreme Court is a separate officer. I am not aware
that any complaint has been made of the system of placing
all registration, except that of the Supreme Court, in
one Department. The Registrar General is an officer of
Class I, Grade II, of the Civil Service and is ^{paid} graded as
such - £1,050 a year rising by annual increments of £50
to £1,200, plus a temporary war allowance of 15 per cent.

My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 1008 of October 15th respecting the creation of the post of Registrar General and to report that on the receipt of Colonel Amery's despatch No. 1467 of December 31st in reply I caused a small committee consisting of the Acting Chief Secretary, one of the Crown Counsel, and the Registrar of the High Court to be formed to consider the matter.

Committee's
recommendations.

2. I now attach a copy of their recommendations from which Your Lordship will perceive that they are in favour of the proposal both as a revenue-producing factor and as a means of affording relief to the officers of the Court, whose work and responsibilities are increasing year by year.

3. In this connection I cannot do better than quote the remarks of the late Chief Justice. In a letter dated April 15th of last year he says:

"The

The Government must
 arrange Government arrangements that will
 relieve the Registrar of extra-departmental work
 in the Registrar's office.

It mattered little that he was
 given the nominal title of Registrar of many matters
 not connected with his duties as Registrar of the
 Court. But now that these matters have grown into
 serious and responsible businesses demanding much
 time and attention they gravely interfere with his
 legitimate work which should be purely departmental.

I attach a memorandum by Mr. Greville Smith
 showing the work that the Registrar is now called on
 to do outside his proper functions. And I would also
 call particular attention to the fact that this work
 may now require him to appear and act as a party in
 cases before the Court, a most undesirable position
 for the Chief Officer of the Court, who as such may
 have to deal with matters to which he is himself a
 party.

A large portion of his time is daily occupied
 with these extra-departmental duties, and it is
 highly inconvenient for the Judges that their officer
 should be prevented from giving his undivided time and
 attention to his duties connected with Court work.

As the only qualified man in the Offices of the
 Court it is his particular duty to pay a close
 attention and legal supervision to the legal drafting
 in the office and as this increases with the expanding
 number and importance of the cases now dealt with
 by the High Court it is imperative that he should be
 freed as far as possible from work that interferes
 with it.

I therefore submit that he should be relieved
 of all extraneous offices except that of Registrar of
 Bills of Sale the duties of which office may for the
 present conveniently be performed by him."

and again in a demi-official letter of July 29th of
 the same year he refers to the subject in the
 following terms:-

"I am writing this for Fawcett to give you on
 your arrival in Nombasa to remind you of a matter
 which you promised to go into some time ago but which
 circumstances have somewhat delayed. I refer to the
 extra-judicial work which is placed on the shoulders
 of the Registrar.

At first these matters did not amount to much
 and one was willing enough to help where one could,
 but the bulk and importance of the various duties
 connected with Companies, Trade names, Trade marks,
 Patents and Designs, and Newspapers has grown so
 enormously that other arrangements will have to be
 made to deal with them.

The two main reasons which make this necessary are (1) The great increase, they caused to the legitimate business of the Registrar of the Court which is essential to the public and especially to the Government of the different concerns which were more attention than the Registrar can give them, with the consequence that their administration and the Princes State Revenue both suffer.

In addition to these two main reasons there is another of great importance and that is that in order to make these registrations effective the controlling officer has to take action in Court against defaulters and it is very unsatisfactory that the Judge's alter ego and confidential Secretary should have to prosecute such matters in the Courts.

The revenue derived from these sources (omitting Bills of Sale which may well remain with the Registrar as at present) was for last year Rs:16,439/-. I anticipate a considerable increase in Company registration and a consequent growth of revenue in the near future, so the Government is in a position to deal with the whole question on a large scale, and I throw out the suggestion that a Registrar General's Office might be inaugurated which would gradually assume control of many other matters of registration besides those in question, i.e. guns, marriages, births, deaths, books, meteorological records etc., etc."

As Your Lordship is aware, Sir Robert Hamilton is now in England and I would suggest that he might be consulted with advantage if any doubt exists as to the advisability of making the proposed appointment.

4. I have discussed the matter with my Executive Council and we recommend that the necessary provision be made in the Estimates for 1921-22. We do not however consider that two European Officers will be required in the first instance, as it will probably be possible to fit in a relief for the Registrar General from one of the other legal Departments, when he goes on leave.

COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED REGISTRAR GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT

At the present time the duties of Registrar of Joint Stock Companies, Registrar under the Business Names Ordinance, Secretary of Inventions and Designs, Registrar of Trade Marks are performed by the Registrar of the High Court and the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages and Registrar under the Newspapers and Books Ordinance by the Secretariat.

The time has in our opinion however now arrived when it is essential that arrangements should be made which will relieve officers of the extra departmental work that has been imposed upon them. This is particularly the case with the Registrar of the High Court who finds that these extra duties interfere with his proper functions. The result of this is that he is unable to devote proper attention to them and in consequence the Administration and Protectorate Revenue both suffer. We append a statement showing the amount of revenue derived under the various heads during the past 6 years and it is estimated that a considerable increase would ensue if an officer were appointed who could devote all his attention and time to these matters.

We would therefore suggest that the above duties be grouped together in one Department at the head of which should be an officer to be called the Registrar-General assisted by a Deputy. As he and in his absence his Deputy will have to interpret the Companies Acts and other Ordinances we consider the appointments are ones which should be held by a barrister or solicitor the more so that such officers will have to appear as prosecutor in cases arising out of the above matters.

The Department is one which should expand but for the present we consider the under proposed staff will suffice.

At present there is no Official Receiver, except in the Saginaw Province where the Administrator General does the work, and we consider that the work of this post for the other Provinces might be performed by the Registrar General but if this is sanctioned an extra clerk would be required. This would certainly prove advantageous from the point of view of revenue as there is no doubt that a considerable profit is obtained by the persons who at present act as receivers. It is difficult to recommend any scales of salary for the appointments of Registrar General and Deputy Registrar General, until the result of the general revision of emoluments throughout the service is known, but such scales should be in time with those approved for other legal departments.
