

In accordance with the instructions
conveyed in Colonel Amery's despatch No. 401 of the
19th March I have the honour to transmit for Your
Lordship's consideration a copy of a report submit-
ted by the Staff Captain, East African Expeditionary
Force, in connexion with the claims put forward by
the Proctor of the Italian Mission in this Protec-
torate on behalf of members of his Society whose
services were loaned for employment to the military
authorities in the late campaign against German
East Africa.

2. I regret the misunderstandings which have
occurred as to the terms of engagement of these
fathers and nurses more especially as the conditions
imposed have not been questioned by any of the other
Missionary bodies whose members volunteered for
service with the local troops or carriers. Your
Lordship will observe from Major Kenny's statement
that the Crown recently has been forced to legal
action against the Italian Mission and has been
awarded recovery of monies to the amount of
Rs:5,500/- in respect of certain overpayments, which
were also contested by the Mission's representatives.

3. I have seen from the penultimate enclosure in Major Kenny's despatch (the letter of 2nd December 1919, addressed to the General Officer Commanding East Africa to the Secretary of the War Office) that the records relating to these claims have been despatched to England, and, in their absence, it is difficult for me to submit recommendations on the specific points raised by the Italian Mission, more particularly as regards the claim for arrears of pay to cover the whole period of employment of the respective Missionaries. I am not disposed to recommend any differential treatment in the last-named respect for the members of the Italian Mission.

4. I agree with Major Kenny that the Mission would not appear to be justified in claiming extra remuneration for expenses incurred in the maintenance of their own Fathers and Sisters during convalescence at Limuru. This special arrangement was made in deference to Bishop Perlo's expressed wishes and the pay of the Missionaries during their holiday should have been adequate to cover maintenance expenses.

5. Inquiries have shown that Sister Cristina was released from military service in the ordinary manner and there is no record of any Medical Board or of her discharge as the result of physical disabilities. The legal Procto^r to the Italian Mission was notified accordingly on the 22nd December last that his application on her behalf for a military disability pension or gratuity could not be entertained.

5th December, and has been paid a gratuity
by the Military Pensions Officer.

6. The payments due to the Mission Authorities
in respect of Father Caneparo have been settled in
Colonel Amery's despatch No. 229 of the 18th February.


7. I have nothing to add to Major Kenny's
decision with regard to the payment of War Bonus.

8. The claims for war service gratuity will
be dealt with under the revised instructions to
which reference is made in the enclosure, the claims
of the Fathers under this head being subject to Your
Lordship's approval and in accordance with the
procedure laid down in your telegram of the 18th May.

9. Clothing allowance was issued only to rank
and file, and neither the Fathers or Nursing Sisters
are entitled to this concession.

10. The two senior officers of the former
Military Labour Corps are now in England as stated
by Major Kenny at the close of his memorandum, and,
if Your Lordship desires further information, I
would suggest that they should be consulted on the
subject of these claims.

Reference your S.30649/15, letter, 2.4.20, the accompaniments to which are returned herewith.

S. - I regret I have no General Headquarter records in connection with the conditions of employment of the Fathers and Sisters of the Italian Mission with the Expeditionary Force, and therefore my remarks will be from my own personal knowledge.

The Mission claims:-

- (i) Pay for Fathers & Sisters prior to 1st January, 1917.
- (ii) Maintenance allowance on account of those who were sent to the Italian Mission at Mombasa to recuperate their health.
- (iii) Compensation for disbursements.
- (iv) Final settlement of pay due to Father Casanova.
- (v) War bonus.
- (vi) War Service gratuity.
- (vii) Clothing allowance of Rs. 60 on release.

Reference (i) above. When the South African Forces were arriving in this country we had to collect a very considerable number of porters and we were very hardily pressed for Medical personnel to look after the Bishop's Parochial then offered the services of certain Fathers and Sisters for the Carrier Hospitals free in anticipation of the campaign ending in a few months, but as there was no immediate prospect of it finishing it was decided that, with effect from 1.1.17, these individuals should be paid and the rate settled was Rs.150/- per month for the Fathers and Rs.75/- per month for the Sisters.

Why the 1st January 1917 was decided as the date from which they should receive I cannot say, but a reference to the Records of the Director of the Medical Services

Services, which are now at the Bishop's place, would
be useless, dear Dr. ...

Reference (ii). The Fathers & Sisters were
not sent to Limuru by the Government Nursing Sisters.

The Fathers were Honorary Freutheants and the
Sisters, Honorary Nursing Sisters, and to my own
personal knowledge were given every consideration.
Had it been necessary for them to be sent to any
country in the world to recuperate their health,
they would have been sent at Government expense.

But, on ~~the~~ religious grounds, the Bishop arranged
that, should recuperation be necessary, they
should be sent to their own Mission at Limuru, and
as will be seen from the Proctor's letter we did
everything possible for their comfort even to
sending motor cars from Nairobi to Limuru to
convey them one mile from the railway station.

Military Officers and Ursuline Sisters requiring
a change for health reasons were given leave and
free passages to Nairobi, South Africa or England
beyond that they had to pay their own expenses,
therefore, I do not see why this Mission should
receive special treatment and be given compensation
for expenses incurred at the Limuru Mission; they
received (or the Bishop did on their account) full
pay the whole time.

Reference (iii). The Mission claim special pension
or gratuity for Sisters Cristina and Catterina. The
Proctor called to see me the other day and among
other papers he had a letter from the Ministry of
Pensions sanctioning a gratuity of Rs. 300/- per
Sister Catterina. So presumably they are getting
all they want under this head, but through what
channel

channel I do not know.

~~Reference (v)~~ - The payment of Rs. 5,500 has been made to the Sisters of the Daughters of Charity. It is requested that you advise me as early as possible, the

Honourable Attorney General, if you consider such a sum the Mission "or an overpayment or over Rs. 5,500, and in this case I think Father Cypriano's pay was assessed as a credit to the Mission.

All my papers are with the Honourable Attorney General and I am awaiting his opinion on this.

Reference (vi). As these people did not draw East African rates of pay they are ineligible for War Bonus.

Reference (vii). The Sisters are eligible for War Service Gratuity under Army Order 194 of 1919 but, on the advice of the Honourable Attorney General, I have withheld payment pending settlement of the action referred to in (v) above. The overpayments are being recovered, but I have not yet heard from the Honourable Attorney General that the money has actually been paid.

The Fathers are now eligible for gratuity under Army Order 437 of 1919, but instructions have been received from the Colonial Office not to pay on this Order without referring each case home.

I understand His Excellency is in communication with the Colonial Office on this subject.

Reference (viii). The Clothing Allowance of Rs. 60/- on release was authorised for rank and file only and not for Officers and Nursing Sisters.

3. The Fathers and Sisters did excellent work

work among our Catholics.

Not only did they receive every consideration

in their arrangements by the Bishop and the Procurer. The whole of their pay went to the Mission and was paid direct to the Bishop; this was arranged by the Bishop obtaining a promise from each individual that their pay should be credited.

I would respectfully suggest that we can get money we can possibly avoid paying, as it will merely be a donation to the Mission.

The Fathers & Sisters are entitled to War Service Gratuity which will be paid in the course, and presumably the Bishop will receive a lump sum on this account to be paid to him and not the individuals who earned it.

I would suggest that Colonel Watkins and Major Leonard, who are in England, would be able to assist the Colonial Office in coming to a decision in this case.

The Commandant agrees with the above.

It is also agreed that he should have the first opportunity to go back by a certain date, and if the accommodation to which he is entitled is not available it is no fault of the Govt. & I do not think any claim should be admitted.

But the question more commonly arises in the case of onward passages. Here it is difficult to compel an officer to go back a certain date, although it may be desirable in the interests of the Govt. that he should do so. What is wanted is an arrangement which will enable the Govt. to send a man to leave if necessary & not at the same time not to give him a grievance. I suggest the following:

(1) No claims to be admitted in respect of the outward journey in the case of officers returning from leave, or proceeding on further leave required except when they are required to go back before the end of their

(3) If an officer whose case falls under (2) has to travel by a steamer in the case of others going out or returning

I being understood that he can be provided with a cabin or steerage

(4) When & cases of health or in the interests of the service it is absolutely necessary for an officer to go abroad to England by a return steamer for which

there is no suitable accommodation, he should receive the difference between the actual cost of his passage & the

minimum of the class to which he is entitled (Class 3rd and 4th) as a temporary ~~and~~ concession during present conditions unless of this kind should be limited as far as possible.

(5) If an officer whose case falls under (2) refuses the concession & elects to go on a steamer his further service in public ground shall not count for leave.

(6) If an officer whose case does not fall under (2) needs to travel by a steamer close to me it will be considered as


