

My Lord,

1. I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 814, dated the 1st instant, and to inform you that the members of the Imperial retinue who are residing in East Africa will be requested by the Government that the local authorities will render all possible assistance within the limits of their jurisdiction. I am glad to find that the members of the retinue are being enabled to maintain their personal staffs of out-pensioners. This has been explained to the Principal of Pensions.

2. Copies of the same despatch, with its enclosures have been forwarded to the Principal Medical Officer and the Military Pensions Officer, who in consultation have prepared the accompanying memorandum, and would be glad to receive the guidance of the Ministry on the various points raised therein. It is possible that many of the inquiries are

treated in the general instructions, which were asked for in the ninth paragraph of my despatch No. 361 of the 14th April, but as they differ materially from those previously I have thought it advisable to forward the statement for consideration by Your Lordship and, also if necessary, by the Ministry of Pensions.

3. There are two main points, however, on which further explanation is required in this connexion:-

(a) The scope of the term "Imperial Forces."

(b) Treatment of Non-Commissioned Officers and lower ranks.

With regard to (a) it is assumed that Imperial Forces comprise every arm, naval, military or air force which served in any part of the world under British command and include Dominion or Colonial troops. (b) This Administration has agreed to charge a flat rate of Rs. 7/- per diem for the maintenance of any European soldier or ex-soldier whether of commissioned or non-commissioned ranks and I shall be glad to learn whether the Ministry of Pensions is willing to accept similar privileges and terms for Non-Commissioned Officers and men on their books or whether special conditions for maintenance, fees and allowances have been formulated by that Department in respect of these ranks and their dependants, whilst

pensioners are undergoing medical or institutional treatment. The revised scales in the meantime will only be charged for the grades mentioned in the letter from the Director General of Medical Services, Ministry of Pensions to the Under Secretary of State, Colonial Office, No.M.S.3/Gen/11 (M.S.2) of the 28th November last.

4. Medical Officers in the Protectorate service are now allowed to receive fees in respect of attendance at Pensioners' Medical Boards and I presume that they, equally with private practitioners in this country, should be granted remuneration at the prescribed rates for treating or operating on ex-members of the Imperial Forces, including the local Forces, in connexion with disabilities contracted on, or aggravated by, active service, as such work obviously is outside the scope of their normal duties. I have authorized this concession provisionally, subject to Your Lordship's covering sanction.

5. I wish to take this opportunity of bringing to Your Lordship's notice my suggestions for medical arrangements in connexion with military pensions work. The existing procedure is for the Principal Medical Officer, Nairobi, as the responsible head of the Medical Service in this Protectorate, to convene Medical Boards and to interview pensioners, who are domiciled in British East Africa, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory. It would appear desirable to continue this centralized organization

organization on a definite basis and to establish a single supervisory authority on medical questions as affecting pensions for ex-members of all British Forces. It is intended that Medical Boards in adjoining Administrations should nominate by the respective principal Medical Officers, appropriate proceedings to be taken in consultation with the relevant Ministers and the appropriate Departments, and to be carried out in accordance with the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Pensions.

It is proposed to have a Conference of the African Ministers in view of this matter.

Re: Medical Treatment of ex-members
of the Imperial Forces residing in Kenya.

Sir,

We have the honour to refer to Colonial Office Circular No. 11, dated 29th January 1920, and to enquire whether, in the event of no institution being available, it would be reasonable during the period of treatment only to charge for payment when certified by a principal medical officer as being reasonable. It is presumed that all country hospitals at Nairobi and its suburbs may be included. We have endeavoured to estimate expenses in connection with the pensioners having to attend a medical officer, & it is necessary to report to the medical authorities for further treatment. In accordance with these views, we think that you will agree that the maximum amount which should be charged is fifteen shillings or £1.00. We are also allowed to remunerate medical officers at £1.00 per visit. We believe it is possible to save in some general examinations already received in the Colony of Kenya, owing to the conditions prevailing thereabouts, to sometimes be more convenient and more economical for the medical officer to pay the patient himself for the patient's services if disabled or unable to see a medical officer. Reasonable travelling expenses could be considered as those incurred by the patient seeking advice or those incurred by a medical officer proceeding to examine a patient in his vicinity or district, or on a round of visits.

Re: Medical Treatment of ex-officers and nurses of
the Imperial Forces resident in East Africa.

Sir,

We have the honour to refer to Colonial Office Circular No. 21 dated the 20th January 1920 and to enquire whether or not there is at present no institution being available for the treatment during the period of treatment of ex-officer or nurse fit for payment when certified by a Principal medical officer as being reasonable. It is presumed that such country treatment at home or abroad may be included. We have written to the Secretary of State in Council to advise the pensioners having to go to a medical ward, &c., if it necessary to report to the medical authorities for further treatment. In case of doubt, we would thank you to advise the reasonable amount which should be paid by the pensioner. We have this allowed to authorise and pay the amount in question so far as it is possible to do so in view of the general conditions already received from the Secretary of State, owing to the conditions prevailing in this colony, it may sometimes be more convenient and more economical for the medical officer to pay the patient sum for the patient's account if disabled by the medical officer. Reasonable travelling expenses could be considered as those incurred by the patient seeking advice or those incurred by a medical officer proceeding to examine a patient in his vicinity or district, or on a round of visits.

2. In paragraph 7 of the despatch the same question is involved which refers to the doctor visiting the patient instead of the patient visiting the doctor, and it is presumed that all such expenditure may be incurred on behalf of other ranks, other than officers, nurses and warrant officers of the Royal Navy.

3. We would also bring before your notice the fact that in many cases addresses quoted by the Ministry of Pensions in regard to pensioners arriving from England are inaccurate, and that it has been found difficult to trace them on arrival in this country, and it would be of great assistance if an accurate address could be ascertained and forwarded to the Ministry at least fifteen days before the pensioner leaves England so that a pensioner may be instructed, before their departure, to make arrangements to report their arrival, either in person or in writing, to the Military Pensions Officer within seven days of their arrival in this country, in order to locate them when they happen to be resident.

4. The office of Principal Medical Officer is often inundated by pensioners who state that in case of a medical examination by a Medical Board they bring no papers in connection with their case. It is considered that it would be of great assistance to all ex-soldiers who are on the pension list to make arrangements to report their departure to the Medical Board so that, in cases where their pension is subject to revision by a Medical Board in this country, arrangements may be made with the Ministry of Pensions whereby all necessary documents for information of the Medical Board may be forwarded to the Military Pensions Officer prior to the date on which the examination falls due. Numbers of the Medical Board complain, with some justification, that, in a difficult case, they are without the means of knowing a patient's previous history, or have

~~future Army~~ the case has been treated in the past, before giving judgment.
