

Sir,

On 8th August 1914 I enlisted in British East African Mounted Rifles and was discharged on or about May 1915 as medically unfit as a result of losing my left leg - only 4 inches of stump remaining.

When I enlisted it was on the distinct understanding that the rate of pay would be 4 rupees per day and that pensions and gratuities would be on the Imperial rate.

From the date of my discharge until 31st December 1916 I received a pension of 10/6 per week and from 1st January 1917 to 31st December 1917 a pension of 25/- per week and also received 14/6 per week from the date of my discharge until 31st December 1916 being the difference between 10/6 and 25/- per week. Since December 1917 I have however only been paid at the rate of 10/6 per week.

I therefore respectfully request that the difference bet between 10/6 and 25/- per week for the period from 31st December 1917 until the present date be paid to me and that, in future, my pension be at the rate of 25/- per week or at the Imperial rate whichever is higher.

I trust that on full consideration of the case and in view of the fact that 25/- per week does not in any way compensate me for the loss of my limb my application will be favourably regarded.
