Compensation to Dependents of African  
Police killed in Action.

With reference to your S. 13859/246 of the 8th June, 1920, in the event of members of the East Africa Police being called upon to serve with Regular troops or when a declaration of a state of active service has been made they automatically become subject to Military Law under Section 42 of the E.A. Police Ordinance 1911 and it has been assumed that they are then subject to all the provisions of the King's African Rifles Regulations.

Compensation under K.A.R. Regulations was paid to the dependents of all African Police killed in action during the late war under the authority of Commissioner's Order of the 27th April, 1918.

PENSIONS - reward and injury - East Africa Police.

It is notified for information that all European Officers and men, and non-European ranks of the East Africa Police, embodied for active service, and consequently engaged in Military operations, not forming part of their normal police duties, are eligible for pensions and gratuities, as laid down in the Royal Warrant and Regulations for the King's African Rifles, as follows:-

Officers - Article 680, Royal Warrant.

N.C.O.'s and men European - Article 1249, Royal Warrant.

N.C.O.'s and men, Non-European - Paragraph 188, etc., Regulations for the King's African Rifles.  
For the above purpose, Officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the East Africa Police are granted as follows, and temporary Military rank will only be held to apply when actually embodied for Military Operations, or duties of a similar nature.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object and reasons for the enactment of the above Ordinance are to adopt (with the omission of the central (100 lbs Standard-weight)) the national Imperial Weights and Measures in the East African Protectorates.

	Short title.
(i)	Substitutes a new Schedule for Schedule C of the Weights and Measures Ordinance, 1912, in which the measurements of parts or multiples of a ton are set out in accordance with the Imperial scale. Accordingly the "pishi" and "Kibaha" which were formerly included in Schedule C are now omitted.
(ii)	For similar reasons the Measures of capacity "A pishi" "A Kibaha" "Half a Kibaha" "One fourth of a Kibaha" are deleted from Schedule F of the Weights and Measures Ordinance, 1912.
