I have the honour to inform you that the Finance Committee of the Joint Societies of the British Red Cross and Order of St. John has decided to offer a grant of £10,000 for relief of those natives of East Africa who are still suffering from wounds and diseases contracted in the war, and has asked me, after consultation with the Colonial Office, to submit a scheme for the administration of this money.

It is believed that there is still much distress from causes above mentioned in the late German Colony, in British East Africa, and to a less extent in Uganda; for many thousands of the natives of those territories were recruited as soldiers, carriers, and for other purposes connected with the campaign. It is hoped therefore that the grant may be useful for equipping the hospitals which have been and are treating such cases.

I may add that there would be no objection to the money being applied towards assisting privately owned as well as Government hospitals, provided that such hospitals are in charge of duly qualified practitioners.

I shall be much obliged if you will be good enough to inform me if the grant will be acceptable, and if so, it is proposed to allocate it.
