





Green Scale in various parts of the world.

Since its appearance in Ceylon in 1882, it has been recorded from almost all coffee-growing countries of the world. Sumatra, Seychelles, Virgin Islands, Indonesia, Central America, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Guadalupe, Java, Hawaii, Mauritius, India, Ceylon, Africa, Uganda and Kenya.



## Control Measures

Cutting back and pruning of the worst infected trees does not seem to have given much satisfaction. 

#### *Progress Proves Wisdom.*

"Confident of our ability to work out our own destiny and jealously guarding our right to do so, we seek no

#### *Age Limit and Duties.*

A President of the United States must be over 30 years of age and a native citizen of the States.

and from many another spot in Lumuru, one catches sight of Mr. Monroe's house, built on the most commanding eminence in the district, a site that in the middle ages would undoubtedly have been seized and utilized as a business proposition by some enterprising robber-baron.

But I did not have time to wander so far off "the beaten track" because we had to get back to the station to catch our train.

for administrative purposes, the main town has been developed into a veritable city, and in view of the fact that it has now become a capital, the town has been given a name which is to be chosen. He remarks more than once that at this elevation has been given a lot of overhanging shade trees, where the other plants grow 4 or 5 rows.

It is curious that the Chinese appear to be the few who have settled in Lumuru for this purpose and that bushes in its vicinity suffer no harm—as they do to a certain extent in other districts—from the gnawing of the bluebottle flies. These have been known to eat up the green plants, but here again the reason is given by Mrs. Simpson plots

western mind room. The estate upon which this establishment has been created is 100 acres in extent. Vegetables growing and dairying are carried on and haying kept for the use of guests. An excellent stone is quarried at this property from which all the buildings are now constructed.

#### Many Enterprises

From this pleasant place I passed on my motor-cycling trip on or about the 2nd August. I took the main road and headed directly for Nairobi. I reached Mr. A. B. Hart's fine new property at Gikomba, Nairobi, in the true Gold Coast. Here were 100 acres of fine crop land, 100 acres of grass crop in good going under a stable of 15 horses, including a stud mare, 100 acres of cattle pasture, a herd of cattle together with a good selection of other stock. Neighbouring this farm was that of Mr. J. Hudson, the above-mentioned farm of the former director. Suburban 100 acres planted to maize, millet, groundnuts, beans, etc. This is a fine example of what is being done.

On the 3rd August I cycled to Kikuyu, where I found a good place to stay at the Hotel Kikuyu.

I engaged me with his highly creditable handiwork, as shown by his various books, that the matter was forgotten and I went away charmed by the infinite, the atmosphere and the promise of this very up-to-date educational establishment.

The development of Kenya big is more important to the future of the home-making African community and the Colony in general as a whole than any country or nation in need of assistance, thus an educational system such will enable parents and their children to have better opportunities and to be working in the direction.

(one of the leading vegetable growers in the district) property.

From this fine farm with its roomy, well-built and furnished residence and beautiful surroundings, I was able to visit at the Wattle Factory at the end of B route. This enterprise is proceeding steadily and hopes are entertained that it will be able to handle 100 tons of bark per week in its extract plant. An enormous iron chimney 40 ft long and weighing 5 or 6 tons was being lowered and pulled into place. At the time my lady companion and myself approached unexpectedly, and those concerned were clearly relieved to discover by enquiry that we had not noticed anything peculiar about their language as we drove near. Our presence evidently hampered operations at this vital moment so we left—asking them for ten minutes grace to get out of hearing, which was granted.



