I have a certain amount of sympathy with Mr.

Mc Clellan and the two other Senior Provincial Commissioners, Mr. Hobley and Mr. Lane, who were at their meetings for some time before the 1st of April last. Mr. Mc Clellan, however, was not so much as complain of in this direction as Mr. Hobley, who became Provincial Comr. in 1902 and Mr. Lane (who became Provincial Comr. in 1904), and I have discussed with you whether it would be possible to do anything for these three without giving away the "weight for the principle of pre-empting the objectionable principle of per diem allowances which we have pledged ourselves to abolish. You agree, I think, that it is impossible to exercise any discrimination of this kind without creating a worse anomaly than ~~they~~ <sup>any</sup> were seeking to justify, and that we must wait for the recommendations of the Committee of the Legislative Council as to whether any increase of salary is recommended for the Provincial Commissioners generally.

There is, I think, something to be said for bringing their salaries up to those of heads of Depts.: the Provincial Comrs. ~~should~~ have great responsibility, or at any rate they ought to have, as it really seems to me difficult to justify them having less than, e.g., the Master General.

This however will, of course, meet Mr. Mc Clellan's complaint, <sup>for some of</sup> but the senior Provincial Comrs. ought to be granted some advantage of their previous years' service. But as to this it should be noted that while it is true that Messrs. Lane and Mr. Mc Clellan have been Provincial Comrs. considerably longer than the remaining three (Isaac, Tate and Traill), yet actual length of service there is not much to choose between them as they all entered the East African Service between '95 and '98.

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Reference new Rates of Salaries.

Under Provincial Administration it appears that Provincial Commissioners are to be on an incremental scale - ranging from £800 to £1000 and that no previous years service counts for increment.-

This incremental scale effects adversely two of the most senior officers in the Colony, Mr. Lane and myself. - Presumably Mr. Lane will present his own case, for myself I ask indulgence to represent that I have served in my present position having had charge of four Provinces out of six - five years Acting (including six months Acting Secretary Native Affairs) on £400 a year, and ten years on the scale for Provincial Commissioners i.e. fifteen years in all.

Up to recent years the Provincial Commissioners have represented the Governor in their Provinces. It has been the custom to entertain all Judges and other officials coming into the station and all Foreign Notables such as Governors, Colonial Secretaries with their staffs (I have had this honour on a salary of £400 a year) and any members of the community who call. It is this entertaining and friendly social intercourse, the rule in some areas which has been responsible for the good relations which have existed between settlers and officials. I put the reasonable cost of entertaining in an European area at £200 a year, if figures are required I can produce them. We have been direct advisers to the Governor and formerly met

met him regularly to discuss the Provincial budgets and other matters of interest including all subjects connected with European settlers requiring attention.- Most Departments reported to the Provincial Commissioners and in turn they reported, at one time, quarterly, to the Governor. Vide quarterly reports 1911- 1913. 89

As will be seen by the list of precedence from 1895 the Sub-Commissioners ranked within one place of the Governor (there was neither Bishop nor Chief Justice nor Honourable Councillors at that time) and for years were entirely responsible for the order and work of all kinds in their Provinces, though their powers have been steadily undermined for the past four or five years. On the new scale of pay it will take Mr. Lane and myself four years further service to obtain the benefits of the maximum whereas officers with comparatively few years service go straight to their maximum of in some instances many hundreds a year increase.-

I would add that after the Masai move and after the Masai were taken from my Province, contrary to promise, I was shewn at Government House a scheme whereby my pay would be increased £100 a year from April 1919 whereby I should have been second in the Native Affairs Department.- Previous to that I was offered my choice of the Provinces of the Protectorate- this I believe can be proved by an officer in the country.


A great point is made by settlers/Non-Official members of Council that the Pioneers should receive more consideration than comparatively new comers, should this only apply to settlers who settled where they chose and were not stalled in some of the most poisonous places in the Protectorate. The death rate of officials between 1895 to 1900 was well on to 50% and I should say that the

death rate in the Administration is still greatly in excess of all other Departments. I would respectfully ask if we are to have no consideration for the past twenty-five years of service - some of those years under very trying conditions. I submit the Administration in recent years has had no one to represent its case whereas all the gentlemen now benefitting by the larger increases are either resident in Nairobi or have become members of the Legislative Council with opportunities of meeting His Excellency and Hon. Chief Secretary at regular intervals.

I do not ask for promotion but only that I may be treated on the same lines as all those other heads of Departments with whom I have served in this country, apparently to the satisfaction of several Governors. I would also respectfully ask permission to refer my case through a Parliamentary member if the Colonial Office is unable to make any alteration in its present ruling.
