Notice to Officers Proceeding on Leave of Absence.

1. Every officer proceeding on leave of absence must be furnished with a duplicate of which he must produce to the Crown Agents for the Colonies, if required, in order to receive his

10. Every officer immediately before proceeding on leave of absence will present to a medical officer of his station (or other medical officer as provided by the local regulations) for examination to the state of his health. The medical officer will furnish him with a paper of advice in proper form, containing directions as to the precautions he should take during the voyage home and after his arrival in the United Kingdom, and also an expression of opinion as to the necessity or otherwise of his being sent to the Colonies. Immediately after the examination the medical officer will post a certificate in the approved form direct to the Colonial Office, so that it will arrive in the same steamer as the officer examined.

11. When an officer arrives in the United Kingdom he will receive instructions from the medical advisers of the Colonial Office if that course is thought necessary, and he is required to show that the recommendations of the local medical officer are being carried out.

12. If an officer falls ill so as to require medical attendance during the voyage home on leave of absence and remains ill for a week, he will report the fact to the Colonial Office by fortnightly reports from his medical attendant as long as he remains under medical care. In the case of invalided officers who are unable on arrival in this country to comply within a week to visit the medical adviser.

13. Unless these rules are observed, an officer will not be entitled to pay during of leave, which may be necessary to grant him on this ground of ill-health.

14. On arriving in England an officer must immediately report his arrival by letter to the Colonial Office, mentioning the place of his residence, the name of the vessel by which he departed, the date of his embarkation and the date of disembarkation. Any subsequent change of residence must be reported to the Colonial Office and to the Crown Agents.
