WEST AFRICAN SISAL.

I understand the Government have the intention of grading this product on a par with the system prevailing in the Dominion of New Zealand.

Sisal or Agave fibre in all its branches has interested me more than any other fibre that I have come in contact with during all my 25 years experience in the trade.

I joined Hindley & Co., Billiter Street, E.C. in 1901 when the Indian Aloe in its practically crude state began to attract the attention of manufacturers here, and I have taken the keenest interest in the development of it and its contemporaries since the ropemakers adopted them for commercial use.

With the above firm and the principal brokers we have handled the bulk of this produce until the advent of Spanish and German African Sisal into the market, which by its decortication and preparation took a prominent position in the trade principally in

America and the Continent but in no little degree, latterly, in this country.

For my firm I was instrumental in introducing them to the States. Even with the Germans superiority over the British productions from India and British East Africa, it, like them, had its failings, viz:- that no reliability could be placed upon the output from the established and known districts.

They had the best decorticating machine in the market but did not pay sufficient attention to the selection of the leaves and classification of the fibre, hence a district which had built up a reputation sooner or later fell into disrepute.

We tried a method of grading after arrival and inspection of the goods in Hamburg, remarking them according to our standard.

This however was very unsatisfactory as we had to purchase for arrival without guarantee, accepting an allowance if inferior and not to implementing our contracts of a guaranteed quality from whatever available source, in order to be within the period of shipment or penalised for default.

I have always advocated a system of grading at the producing place and as I am conversant with the requirements of the manufacturers trade in general I could institute a method of selection in the

plantations to be supervised at the port of shipment which would prove highly remunerative to the plantations and give satisfaction and confidence to the consumers and merchants in the manufacturing centres.

I have just left the Army after serving with the Royal Field Artillery since 11th December 1915, and although I have had 25 years experience in the fibre trade at home I would now rather continue at the producing end and take an active part in the betterment of the fibre of which I can foresee a very bright future if properly handled, and dealing with shipments from this side which cannot be relied upon.
