Sir,

I am directed by the East African Currency Board to enclose a copy of a telegram received from the Currency Officer (the Chief of Customs) at Mombasa, suggesting that notes of all denominations higher than 5 florins should be expressed in pounds sterling.

The Board are disposed to accept this suggestion except that they consider that the term "sterling" is not applicable and should be omitted; and, if the Secretary of State concurs they would propose that the draft currency note ordinance enclosed with my letter of the 6th May should be amended by adding in section 4, after subsection (1), a new subsection in the following terms:-

"(2) The denominations of currency notes may at the discretion of the Board be expressed in terms of florins, or of pounds at the rate of ten florins to the pound, or of both."

3. The preparation of the notes of higher value than 5 florins is being suspended till the receipt of your reply to this letter, which is therefore requested at your earliest convenience.
