Mr Bottomley.

This is a nightmare!

The rule has always been quite clear and has been followed in every case in which we have had a say.

The leave granted is either:

(a) Civil leave with Civil rates under civil regulations in respect of whole tour (including K.A.R. service)

(b) K.A.R. leave with K.A.R. rates under K.A.R. regulations irrespective of K.A.R. service only, whichever is more favourable.

(c) This is the only situation most favourable though the pay may be somewhat lower, the length of leave must always be greater.

I think it's wrong to say as stated in P.D. 2 or despatch that this rule was suspended by despatch C.P. 11/1941 U.C. 63705/19 K.A.R. The despatch on 18th May 1941 confirmed the rule.

I don't see what we can do except point out as above, express regret that the fiscal authorities should have modified the rule laid down by the S of S without consulting him, especially in a sense inconsistent with the spirit of the rule, and to ask to say that in the circumstances the S of S can only urge the Governor to clean up the matter on the following lines.

- (1) In future cases of such commutation of K.A.R. leave to be allowed;
- (2) Subject to (3) refunds not to be insisted on, and, where already made, to be cancelled, but pay to make all the arrangements for this himself and to inform the officer concerned of what has been decided.
- (3) In no case should an officer be allowed to have both K.A.R. leave and civil leave in respect of

the same period of service whether as a lump sum or
as leave proper.

(The paper should be noted on all the files of
the officers named in the enclosure as we may have further
correspondence with individuals about the matter.)

part of the draft.



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My Lord,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Colonel Amery's despatch No. 407 of 19th March regarding the leave of Mr. G. W. Knapman, Office Superintendent in the Secretariat, and to bring to Your Lordship's notice the unavoidable position in which this officer, and other officials of the Protectorate Service who were seconded to the military during a period of their tour of service, find themselves owing to a refund being demanded from them of the money which they received in respect of leave earned on military service.

2. In this connection I have to refer to Mr. Long's telegram of 27th June 1918 which laid down the conditions on which such leave was to be computed, of the substance of which both the Treasurer and the Assistant Adjutant and Quarter-Master General, King's African Rifles, were notified. This ruling held good until it was suspended by that given in Your Lordship's despatch No. 1273 of 26th November 1918.

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3. In March 1919 Captain Rainsford enquired whether he might compound the leave due to him in respect of his King's African Rifles service. His application was recommended by the Treasurer and passed by the Deputy Assistant Adjutant and Quartermaster General and was sanctioned by Sir Edward Northey in anticipation of Your Lordship's approval and this, together with the general question of compounding leave was submitted in his despatch No. 329 of 16th April 1919. To this despatch Your Lordship replied generally in a telegram dated 2nd August, but as no mention was made of the specific case reported, it was assumed that Your Lordship acquiesced in the procedure adopted and it was not until the receipt of Colchel Amery's despatch No. 89 of 20th January, that any exception was taken to Sir Edward Northey's action. In the meantime Captain Rainsford's leave had expired, and payments in lieu of leave earned with the military had continued to be made.

4. The Chief Paymasters, King's African Rifles, and East Africa Pay Corps, can quote no authority empowering them to commute leave earned for a money payment. It appears however that the procedure was adopted to save unnecessary work, as the payment of a lump sum to the officer concerned entailed fewer book entries and less correspondence than the monthly payment of moneys during the period of leave earned by the officer concerned, and also minimised the inconvenience that would have been caused had officers elected to take the full leave due to them. The reasons for this are more fully set out in my Confidential Despatch No. 93 of 14th

5. I feel sure that Your Lordship will agree that it would be inequitable in the highest degree to penalise junior officials for the misunderstanding that has occurred, and that Captain Rainsford, could hardly anticipate having to refund so large a sum of money after being informed that Sir Edward Northey had sanctioned the commutation. This would also apply to other cases for which Captain Rainsford's served as a precedent. Even if Captain Rainsford had anticipated any objections being raised, he could have hardly foreseen that such would be the case after the long interval which had elapsed between the permission being given and the subsequent event.

6. Although, in theory, the refund of gratuities or payment for leave commuted only means the transfer from the payee's bank of those moneys which he has received, yet in practice, it means that the beneficiary has to return moneys which he has, probably, spent in purchases of property, movable or immovable, and which can only be realized at a loss. In brief, Your Lordship is aware that such refunds often entail considerable hardship.

I enclose, as requested in paragraph 2 of Colonel Amery's despatch No. 407 of 19th March, a complete list of officers who were permitted to commute their military leave. In one case it will be observed that an officer will have to refund fully a whole year's salary plus War Bonus, and after deduction of the commutable value of his leave. Again, I am doubtful whether any could be made from officers who have or who would wish to resign rather than

7. In my despatch No. 95 of 28th January the facts of the case were not fully represented to Your Lordship, and I feel sure that Your Lordship will concur in my view that these refunds for leave earned in respect of military service, will entail considerable hardship on the officers concerned, and I earnestly trust that Your Lordship will give the question your sympathetic reconsideration.

8. If, as I hope, Your Lordship will consent to waive the refund of amounts already paid, I would recommend that such a ruling should only be retrospective and should be conceded as an act of grace to those who have been placed in difficult circumstances arising out of the misunderstanding for which they were not responsible. It is not proposed that officers who have commuted on the Civil basis should be entitled to claim the additional amount obtainable by commutation under King's African Rifles Regulations.
