You raised certain points in connexion with this leave calculation.

(i) 30 days counting as a month.

Please see minutes on 28061/15 and papers.

(a) The "anti-dating" privilege was started with the "new" leave regulations and was made applicable when officers were travelling by Union Castle steamers.

It was extended to those travelling by the Messageries Maritimes.

(c) Despatch to East Africa Protectorate 21st June 1915 explained at greater length that the privilege was not limited to officers who had completed or nearly completed a tour of service.

(d) I feel pretty ^{certain} that of recent times the proviso as to numbers of days short of a month not exceeding number of days over a month which an officer would serve if he waited for the next steamer has been somewhat overlooked. When we put up from King's African Rifles Headquarters to have 20 days count as a final month, the Secretariat never told me of any such proviso.

As the King's African Rifles officers are allowed to count as a month ⁺ 20 days or more of their final month in East Africa, I should like to suggest that we rule the same for civil officials in all the East African Protectorates and so inform Protectorates officially. There is no need to consult Treasury (who would no doubt agree anyway - see minutes on 28061/15).

Mr. Parkinson.

I felt sure that we had informed all the East African Governments of the 20 days rule, but cannot find that we did so. It was laid down in the minutes

minutes on File 5747/13 that this should be done, but it was apparently overlooked. Later, arising out of File 5468/11, a paper on this point was registered (C.O. 42931/20), but the Crown Agents only were informed and not the Governors.

Perhaps we should now inform all the Governors, expressing regret that this was not done before, and saying that the matter will be reviewed in January next. In the case of Nyasaland, say that the date 3rd July is correct.
