With reference to Colonel Asery's Confidential despatch of 8th January, relating to the cultivation of maize at Mount Marsabit, I have the honour to inform Your Lordship that the crop has unfortunately again proved a failure. The acreage planted was considerably increased this year, the rains however failed completely and as a consequence only 1,500 lbs of maize have been reaped.

2. In the absence of rainfall records prior to 1910 at Marsabit, it is impossible to say what is the average yearly rainfall there. If the amount which has fallen in recent years is up to the average, the experiment appears to be doomed to failure.

3. It is however believed that the last 3 years have been exceptionally dry and in an opinion that further planting should be undertaken before the scheme is condemned and abandoned.



I would suggest, if possible, prior to the
1900-1901 session, that we shall have to give an
account of our progress in the technical officers as well
as the salaries of doctors. (2) on difficulty
largely arises at the present time owing to the
extraordinary salaries paid to the staff. This will not
last and I think that in two or three years time there
will probably be no difficulty in getting doctors at
a reasonable salary.

The first step is to send a copy of the
proposed plan to the Treasury, and wait their approval.
For the previous salary recommendations by Sir J. Forster,
1898-99, the Treasury is satisfied that this is the
best minimum likely to attract suitable candidates,
and that, if it fails in some way, it will be necessary to
consider the matter further. And ask for a reply at
their earliest convenient moment, as it is imperative
to fix the existing vacancies without delay.

It is satisfactory that there seem likely
to be no few retirements.
