Colonel Montgomery has had the pleasure of the following letters from you relating to our grant of £20,000 for the relief of the sick and disabled in the East African Administrations:-

- No. 69744/1919-20 of 21st December, 1919.
- " 73662/1919-20 " 21st January, 1920.
- " 1275/1919-20 " 21st January, 1920.

These letters with the proposals respectively for the East Africa Protectorate, "German" East Africa, Tanganyika and Zanzibar, to which you had allocated the following sums:-

East Africa Protectorate.....	10,000
German East Africa.....	2,400
Tanganyika.....	400
Zanzibar.....	2,600

leaving a balance of \$1,500 for Uganda, the report for which has not yet been received.

I am sorry to say that your proposals for allocation in the above letters were written to the Officers in Charge of four of the Administrations, offering them sums which do not correspond with those allocated by the Colonial Office. These letters were written after Colonel Montgomery had put himself into communication with you, and we deem that they are considered cancelled. We shall be glad if you will inform the Administrative Officers of the East African Protectorates, Tanganyika, Zanzibar and Uganda, and express regret for our mistake.

letter from which it will be seen that the Company have instructed their West African manager to use every possible endeavour to work up to a production of 80,000 tons for the last six months of 1950.

We ourselves have very little doubt that this rate of production can be obtained, and we, therefore, feel that we should not lose a moment in impressing upon the Colonial Government the necessity of making the necessary provision for working with the 80,000 tons of steel for six months.

Colonel Enfield and I met Mr. B. G. Grey, that the whole matter had been discussed at length and that rolling stock and engines had been ordered to deal with this extra traffic and that unless the manufacturers could deliver the rolling stock there should be a difficulty in coping with the considerable quantities of steel which will be required.

My Company would be grateful if the Government could be informed how very vital we consider it to delay whatever should take place in the fulfilment of the Government's obligation for the early delivery of steel to our Manager.

IMPORTANCE OF SODA PROMOTION IN 1931

Enquiries which we have recently conducted show that there exists at the moment a world shortage of soda and soda products

We have endeavoured to verify our conclusions on this matter and there exists very little doubt, not only that this shortage exists, but that it will be intensified during the next twelve months

Probably a world shortage of coal is as much responsible for it as anything else, although the fact that the soda works in Belgium were destroyed, and the Solvay works in Germany are hardly recommenced operations, and will not be able to do so economically owing to the coal shortage in Germany, has considerable effect

We find that certain concerns to which soda, more especially caustic soda, is an essential, are compelled to pay unheard of prices to obtain their requirements. We find also that in some cases our competitors are refusing to renew contracts with individual firms for anything more than 50% of their previous quantity

We look to you to use every agency to restrict production in June, or at the latest July of this year

In June of last year, when we informed the Under Secretary of State for the Colonies that the Board had decided to suspend production, we informed him that although the British Government had given notice in the year 1929 that the production of soda would be reduced to 100,000 tons, the Board still stood, and that the necessary arrangements would be made to reduce the production to 100,000 tons

It may be desirable for you at your end to see the General Manager of the Uganda Railway and point out to him that we shall require traffic to commence in June, and shall require to move it considerably over the original traffic estimate of 50,000 tons per year during the remaining six months of the year.

You will remember, no doubt, that the contract which we have in a certain quarter will necessitate the delivery of 50,70000 tons per year during 1920, and it will therefore mean that any soda which we may require to deliver to meet the world's shortage will have to be produced over and above these 50,70000 tons.

We have, of course, always looked upon the plant which you are now working as nothing more than a preliminary to our full output, but in view of the increasing faith which everyone seems to have in the pontoon, we presume that we may reckon on an output by the pontoon of some 40 tons per hour, or, in fact, about 25% less than the output for which she was designed.

We gather from your recent letter that the Betty end machinery will be capable of dealing with about 40 tons per hour; the pipe line, of course, will deal with this output or very considerably more.

The "Berber" washing tables, the "Bidlake" cones, the "Carr" rollers, or more correctly, supplemented by the washing tables, should be capable of handling 40 tons per hour of soda, if, of course, there is no weak link in the chain which would be the Calsoners.

The Calsoners were designed to produce 15 tons of Calsoned Ash per hour, that is to say, they might be expected to deal with 15,20 tons and 40 tons of soda in fact. In practice the mills have never dealt with more than 5 tons of Ash per hour, or, say, 15 tons of soda. It remains to be seen whether the improved furnace arrangements, the improved
