## Jubaland Development Scheme

States that Mr Walford has transf<sup>r</sup> his right to J.N.W. Synd. & that Mr Shelford has left for Zafica for purpose of negotiating with Govt. in conn. with application for land grant.

Mr ~~Read~~ Testifies

This letter is no doubt the result of the interview with me recorded on Gov/26962 below.

The J.N.W. Syndicate, in whose name Mr Walford used to write in the latter stages of his correspondence with us, now apparently wish to revive the suspended proposals for the taking over of Mr Agyropulo's holdings, the acquisition of a further 14,000 acres of land, and the taking over of Mr Nesbitt's steamers on the Juba. It is to be gathered from the previous correspondence and from 26962 below, that the Governor is indifferent to these proposals, but it is evidently necessary from the last sentence of Gov/23817 that we should not commit ourselves in any way without the Governor's full concurrence. It is therefore all to the good that Mr Shelford, on behalf of the Syndicate, should see the Governor locally in the first instance. Mr Shelford has not gone out expressly ~~with~~ this purpose. He has gone for

It is proposed to form this Syndicate in order to acquire from Mr. Araymopolu, a brilliant engineer, about 5000 acres of land situated on the west bank of the Juba River, British Abyssinia, for the cultivation of Cotton, Rice, Timber and other tropical products, also his two steam traction engines, each of 60 h.p., ploughs, harrows, centrifugal pumps for irrigation, and scientific instruments, &c.

It is also intended that the Syndicate shall acquire the property and Steam Flotilla belonging to the Emperor Navigation Company, which comprises a repairing shop, tools and stores at Gobwen, two light draft steamers for carrying passengers and cargo, five barges on the River Juba, two barges of forty tons, now at Aden, and the new passenger and cargo steamer "Bajune" now lying in London. This steamer, together with the barges lying at Aden, will be delivered by the Emperor Navigation Company, at Kisimyu, at its risk and expense.

Two thousand four hundred acres of land are already cleared for cultivation, and Mr. Araymopolu estimates that the cultivation of rice on each 300 acres will produce within twelve months a nett profit of £600. He also estimates, that when 300 acres are planted with cotton, same will produce a nett profit of £11,040.

The close vicinity of the Juba River to the property renders the contemplated irrigation easy and economical, and makes the Company independent of the variable rainfall of the district.

It is anticipated that a considerable profit will be earned by the flotation, the navigation of the river being practicable on an average for five months in the year. The British Colonial Authorities attach much importance to this service.

The labour question presents no difficulties there being no competing industries such as exist on the West Coast of Africa. The population is composed mainly of agriculturists who are attracted to the property proposed to be purchased from Mr. Argyropoulos owing to the land being prepared for them by steam ploughing and other mechanical appliances, according to the estimate of the British Government there are more than 40,000 inhabitants in Jubaland.

It is proposed that the Syndicate shall establish trading depots and stores at Kimayu, Cobweb, and other suitable points on the river, and it is anticipated that in this way a considerable business with the native traders will be developed which could not be carried on advantageously without the Syndicate.

Mr. Argyropoulos has placed his services at the disposal of the Syndicate, and he is proceeding within ten days to Jubaland where he will be able to take up the management of its business.

Mr. Argyropoulos will receive 15,000 fully paid-up Shares as the purchase consideration for his land and machinery as before mentioned.

Mr. George James Nesbitt, trading on the "Emperor Navigation Company", will receive 20,000 fully paid-up shares for his property and steam flotilla, and barges as before mentioned.
