

ORDER IN COUNCIL 1910.

RULE ISSUED BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE
ACTING GOVERNOR WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE
SECRETARY OF STATE UNDER THE PROVISIONS
OF THE EAST AFRICA AND UGANDA (CURRENCY)
ORDER IN COUNCIL 1910.

ACTING GOVERNOR.

1. No person shall wilfully efface
or tear out or otherwise mutilate a currency
note issued under the East Africa and Uganda
(Currency) Order in Council 1905 of the
denomination of Rs.5 or of Rs.10.

Any person guilty of an offence under
this Rule shall be liable, on conviction,
to imprisonment of either description for a

term not exceeding three months or to a
fine not exceeding fifteen hundred rupees
or to both.

It appears to me that it would be preferable to make the rule applicable to the imitation of currency
