Sir,

In reference to my letter of January 31st last herewith copies of correspondence passed between Captain Grogan and myself on the subject of the proposed exchange of land held by him in the Nairobi Province for an area on the Athi Plains.

2. Captain Grogan has satisfied me that he is able to deal with 100,000 acres in the name of Watt and Grogan, and that he has a moral claim to the same area. In view of the fact that no arrangements as to revision of rent after 10 years are to be insisted upon, he has at first stated that he would be willing to give up any area less than 50,000 acres, and now says 36,682 acres. As he has agreed to relinquish the land in exchange for 100,000 acres, I am inclined to accept his revised statement that he will give up 80,000 acres of land available on the Athi River between the stations of the East side of the Uganda Railway.

Your Excellency,

Re proposed exchange of Ravine land
for land on the Athi plains.

The principle of an exchange of land in the
Ravine contracted by me and now occupied by the
Native Government, the Uasin Gishu Reserve for land on the
Athi plains has been agreed by myself and the
Government and endorsed by the Colonial Office.

My original arrangement with the Government was
based on the precedent established by an identical
exchange of land between the Hon. Mr. Newland and
the Government.

The Colonial Office, however, desired that in my
case the new conditions of a periodical re-adjust-
ment of rent should be established, and suggested
that I should be given a larger area than I would
be otherwise entitled to in consideration of my
accepting this new condition.

I pointed out to the Colonial Office that under
the old conditions I should pay roughly £5,000 in
rent during a period of the lease, whereas, under
the new conditions I might have to pay roughly
£120,000; but at the same time I accepted the new
condition provided that the proposed increase of
area was adequate.

I understood from the Colonial Office that I was

to settle the amount of compensation with the Land Officer, since the Local Land Officer had no knowledge of the land in question.

I now understand from the Land Officer that he has no instructions concerning the gratuity at this point.

I am at present paying rent without benefit of land occupied as a Native Reserve and would like to know how far I am to carry the matter to a negative or positive conclusion.

Sir,

In reply to your letter No. S.450 of April 18th addressed to Captain Grogan, I beg to inform you that Captain Grogan has already satisfied the Land Officer as to his interest in Mr. Latt's 4173 acres, and that in respect to Mr. Goldman's 9463 acres I hold a deed of sale from Mr. Goldman to Mr. Grogan containing a power of attorney enabling him to deal with the property, and that in respect of the 5249 acres, balance of 10,000 acres, Mr. Grogan has seen Mr. Barton Wright who admits that the 5249 acres are due.

I am desired by Captain Grogan to say that he is prepared to accept His Excellency's offer to recommend to the Secretary of State that he be offered as an exchange 20,000 acres between Kapiti and Athi River Stations on the East side of the Uganda Railway with the usual conditions as to the revision of rent after 33 and 66 years.

Directive, July 1905, gave permission to Europeans to buy land in the ravine section in 1906 contrary to the wishes of the natives and to Mr. Fletcher, who was then the Land Officer. The time was during the year 1906. The Land Officer, Mr. Groupon reserved the only land then available - some 18,000 acres - which was for the most part stony and barren and had consequently not been applied for by Europeans.


In October 1906 Mr. Hobley, Provincial Commissioner, Naivasha, wrote to the Commissioner of Lands asking that the Uasin Gishu Native Reserve might be increased as it was inadequate for their wants. Mr. Ainsworth, who succeeded Mr. Hobley, likewise took up the question with the result that Colonel Montgomery visited the Ravine in February 1908. As he was convinced that enough land had not been reserved for the natives the following farms, situated on the Molo River, were reacquired during the 1909 negotiations and handed over to them.

The natives are now occupying the land in the reserve. Whilst the grazing rights are already given, they have to pay for the protection of the boundaries of their Reserve and prevent the natives from grazing their cattle on the neighbouring farms.

In the event of Captain Grogan relinquishing
the Goldman, Grogan and Watt farms and these areas
are added to the Uasin Gishu Masai Reserve, the
total area of the Reserve will be 57,000 acres.
The Reserve will be administered by the
Kenya Government.

I have the honour to inform you that the Medical Officer in charge, Tana Land, has reported that Ahmed bin Mohamed bin Abubakar, Clerk to the Sultan of Witu, is suffering from leprosy and has recommended that he should not be allowed to return to work.

2. In May 1896, i.e. 16 years ago, he was appointed as Arabic Clerk at Port Dufferord on Rs.40 per mensem, and when the port was abolished in 1902 he was transferred to Witu on Rs.35 per mensem and raised in 1908 to Rs.50 per mensem which is his present salary.
