Sir,

In reply to your telegram of the 9th instant requesting explanations in support of the increases of Staff asked for by the Chief of Customs in his Memorandum of February 26th, a copy of which I attach for convenience of reference, I have the honour to transmit herewith a further Memorandum by that officer giving the reasons for which such increases are deemed urgent.

2. I pointed out to Mr. Major that you wished to have figures showing the growth of work during the last twelve months and these he has now supplied but at the same time he is anxious that it should not be supposed that the Staff was really sufficient even twelve months ago. This he asserts most strongly was not the case. He was even then only just able to carry on the work, and now he says that it is impossible to do so without giving occasion for complaints from the general public, which are becoming increasingly frequent and cannot in the present circumstance be considered to be entirely without justification.

The rapid increase of trade of the Protectorate and the consequent rush of work at the port ~~of Mombasa~~ necessary for me to have more assistance.

I was not here when the Estimates were drawn up, being absent on leave, or I would have put in for more Officers.

I require the following increase to the STAFF.
1 Assistant at £.500 to £.400 by £.10 per annum.
5 European Clerks at £.180 to £.300 by £.10 per annum without pension rights
or
at £.180 to £.180 by £.10 per annum with pension rights.
Plus £.40 House Allowance per annum in both cases when Government quarters are not found.

One of these has already been applied for in the place of Mr. Retford who is resigning.

I trust Your Excellency will recognise the necessity of increasing the Custom Staff.

I suggest that H.M.'s Commissioners of Customs be asked to select an Officer of the class of Mr. Cox recently selected by them and three men from their staff of Customs Preventive men, their ages to be between 30 & 35. Full particulars have been given in a minute to the Chief Secretary asking for the selection of a man to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Retford's resignation.

Increase of Customs Staff

Reference Your Mariate No. 8880 of
the 19th instant.

An increase of Staff is necessary for the
following reasons:-

The Value of Imports has increased since 1908-1909
by £.623,229 - an increase of 59 %

The value of Exports by £.600,910 10. do. 187 %

The Revenue (Customs) by £. 32,780 10. do. 47 %

The number of packages } 414,549 10. do. 65 %
cleared by

The number of Entries by 11,000 do. do. 69 %

The number of Ships Reports } 170 do. do. 74 %

The number of Ships Reports } 214 do. do. 118 %

All this has entailed a great increase of checking and supervision work.

The European Staff has only been increased by the appointment of an Indian Inspector of the Preventive Service instead of the Indian Sub-inspector.

"It was impossible to say with any certainty until last year whether the ease of trade was likely to be permanent. I am now satisfied on this point and therefore consider that the time has arrived to increase the strength of the European Staff.

I have endeavoured so far to fall in with His Excellency's policy of strict economy and of cutting down expenditure as much as possible, and I have therefore refrained from asking for increases but in the interests of the revenue an increase of expenditure must now be faced.

More supervision of outstations by Europeans is required. At present the file of the European Staff is fully occupied at Head Quarters, and even although

although they are all retained here if one of them
is fit on the sick list the work falls into arrear.

No barrack is provided for officers on leave.

More Europeans are required for the examination
of passengers' baggage, as with the class of
passenger now coming to the Protectorate a good deal
of dissatisfaction is expressed at baggage being
examined by Indians. It is also desirable to direct
European intelligence to this work.

It is proposed to utilise the services of the
three Preventive men from the Imperial Customs for
baggage examination and for assisting in routine
and checking work.

The Ships' Records, Inwards and Outwards (Ships
files) are increasing enormously in size and it is a
difficult matter to keep the checking of them up to date,
a most important item of Customs check.

I would not have asked for an increase of staff
had I not been fully satisfied as to the necessity
for it. I trust that no obstacles will be placed in
the way of giving me what I ask for on the score of

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economy. I consider that it would be false economy to delay providing additions to the staff necessary to ensure the proper collection of revenue.



sanction the immediate appointment of
one new Assistant on the scale of
salary £250-15-£400, and two new
European clerks on the ordinary
scale of salary, viz. £120-10-180
(pensionable) or £130-10-200 (un-
pensionable).
