Dear Mr. Sterry.

Your letter of yesterday just to hand.

I am sorry to say that among the men already qualified I do not know anyone whom I could recommend for the two prospective veterinary appointments. If, however, quite recently qualified men would do I might be able to get two for you from among those who are going up for the final examination next month. The examinations here will be finished about the 20th July. If you think that would do you might let me know what salary will be offered and the other conditions of the appointments.

I regret to say that there is a prospect that we shall not be able to supply men for all the vacancies arising at home and abroad in the near future. A month ago I sent out two men to Egypt, and this week I have a letter saying that six more are required immediately.

I also do not know anyone who would be likely to accept the post of Laboratory Assistant, but I have no doubt that you can get plenty of applications if you will insert an advertisement in the medical papers.

I am glad to know that we shall see you when you are next in London.
