Sir,

I have the honour to refer to paragraph 32 of the Postmaster General's report for 1910-11, a copy of which I enclose for convenience of reference.

2. You will observe that it is suggested that the inland telegraph rates should be reduced and I am in sympathy with the recommendation as lower charges almost always stimulate traffic and encourage trade generally.
3. I fear however that the change would necessitate the employment of additional staff and that the extra expenditure involved would not be balanced by a corresponding increase in revenue, at any rate just at first.
4. I attach a statement by the Postmaster General showing the financial effect of the proposal.
5. In spite of this drawback I still favour the suggested reduction as I consider it to be in the public interest that telegraph rates should be as low as possible.

Telegraph Revenue for 1911/12 ..... Rs. 90,000

Estimated increase for 1912/13 at present rates  
(10 cents per word) ..... Rs. 15,000

Total Estimated Revenue for 1912/13 at  
present rates ..... Rs. 105,000

Estimated revenue for 1912/13 at reduced rates  
(6 cent) presuming same number of telegrams sent ..... Rs. 78,750

Butte presuming an increase of 25% due to  
reduced rates ..... say, ..... Rs. 98,000

That is an estimated increase of Revenue on reduced  
rates of Rs. 8,000 against Rs. 15,000 at present rates.
