East Africa it is 30 lbs. It is unanimously admitted by naturalists and sportsmen that the only weight which will safeguard the female elephant and the young herd bulls is 30 lbs. It is therefore earnestly recommended that the weight of 30 lbs. be taken as the international standard. However, should the negotiations come to nothing for the reason that 30 lbs. is considered too light, it would be better to accept 25 lbs. as the standard but any reduction much below this weight would be of little or no value as a means of preserving the elephants.

The following provisions are suggested for International Convention. They are simple and would give the highest possible protection.

- i. Possession of the ivory rhinoceros, hippopotamus, and other animals shall be legal only if the animal was lawfully obtained by the possessor or his neighborly assistance.
  - (a) For the purpose of this Convention, any animal which has been lawfully obtained by the possessor and afterwards becomes the property of another person bearing an obligation of good faith.
  - (b) When the animal is in the possession of a person who has obtained it lawfully, it shall be considered as having been lawfully obtained by the possessor and afterwards becomes the property of another person bearing an obligation of good faith.
- ii. It shall be illegal to trade in ivory and in any other animal which is listed in the Convention if the animal is less than 30 lbs. in weight.

The intrinsic value of ivory, which is likely to increase as it becomes scarcer, will always make it profitable to smuggle that so long as it can be done with a certain degree of success; there will always be some people

who will be tempted to do so, and it is only by a strict and uniform application of the Convention that this can be prevented.

Now no matter how strictly Game Regulations may be enforced in some territories, so long as there is practically no restriction on the export of ivory and rhinoceros horns at some ports, the illegal trade in ivory and rhinoceros horns will continue to flourish.

It is requested that His Majesty's Government should consider the possibility of imposing a uniform restriction on the export of ivory and rhinoceros horns from all territories under their control.

Now this is a state of affairs which can only be dealt with by international co-operation. Such co-operation will only be successful if all the territories concerned agree to adopt a uniform restriction on the export of ivory and rhinoceros horns.

For instance if British East Africa and Uganda, German East Africa and Italian and British Somaliland to adopt a Universal Code of Laws and strictly Administer them, while the Congo Free State and French Somaliland remain apathetic, the result would be that, after a sufficient lapse of time, which would be incredibly long for ivory traffickers, and especially for rhinoceros smugglers, all the illegally killed ivory and rhinoceros horns would be taken into those territories where they could be profitably disposed of without risk and would eventually find their way out at the ports, Beira and Jubba, and thence to the coast. It is a matter of doubt a considerable and acceptable amount of ivory and rhinoceros horns would be smuggled out of the territories mentioned above.
