AGRICULTURAL DEPT ESTIMATES 1913-4

Desires to create new posts of Mycologist Assistant Entemologist Additional Laboratory Asst two additional Veterinary Officers and one Veterinary Officer in the place of Livestock Inspector Recommends new scales of salary for the Chief Vety Offr, the Deputy Chief Vety Offr, Veterinary Officers Stock Inspectors and Veterinary Pethologist

The Governor proposes to create four new posts (I do not include the two temporary veterinary officers whose appointment has already been sanctioned), and to increase the scales of salary of the whole of the The material increase of Expenditure veterinary staff. involved in these proposals amounts to about £2,000

- This is a very considerable increase in the Agricultural Department vote, following as it does on an increase of over £2,000 in the Estimate for the current year, but, having regard to the fact that agriculture and stock raising are the two staple industries of the country on which the whole prosperity of the Protectorate depends I am not prepared to say that the imrease is not justified, and I think that we should support the Governor's proposals

To turn to details.

New Appointments.

I have not theslightest doubt that the/ Mycologist. appointment of a Myeologist is desirable. I noticed in the last East African papers reports that disease had broken so, it is most important that it should be checked as quickly as possible. As to the melection of a suitable candidate Sir David Prain will perhaps be able to help us.

Assistant Entomologist. I have no doubt that this appointment too is very necessary, but ? Shall we be able to get a good enough man for the money, £250-15-300.

Two Temporary Veterinary Officers These have already been approved by the Treasury . One (Mr. Beegan) is already appointed - the other is going out very shortly.

One Veterinary Officer in place of the Livestock Inspector.

We have not yet received the despatch on the subject of the transfer of Mr. Neave to the Northern Frontier District as Officer in charge of transport. But it is quite clear that we shall have to do something to improve transport on the Northern Frontier, and prima facie the proposal would appear to be a good one. This appointment will presumably mean a permanent addition to the veterinary Staff, though the officer should be engaged for three years the first m stance.

Increase in emoluments of existing Staff. Having regard to the great demand for good vefterinary officers all over the world, I have not the alightest doubt

that it is necessary to improve the salaries of our veterinary officers, or we shall run the risk of lesing them, which in the East Africa Protectorate we cannot afford to do. The only observations that I have to make with regard to the Governor's proposals are t-

- I much prefer £200-10-250 to the scale (d) proposed by the Governor (£200-15-245) for Stock Inspectors. Under the Governor's proposal they will reach the maximum of the scale at the end of three years, and will demand a further increase before they are re-engaged. It has been a settled principle for some time past that the increment should be £10 per annum in the case of all scales of salary commencing at less than £250 per annum.
- Mr. Montgomery is at present drawing £525 per annum in the scale of salary of £500-25-600 and to raise him, as proposed by the Governor, to £600-50(\$25) -700 long before he has reached the maximum of his present scale is a very big jump. Beades it would make his scale of salary the same as the Head of his Department which does not seen des rable. Would it not be sufficient to give him a Duty allowance of £50 per annum? Now that there is an Assistant to the Veterinary Pathologist it is desirable that there should be a duty allowance which the deputy can draw when acting for Mr. Montgomery in the latter's absence.

I suggest that we wait to see what is the general financial position of the Protectorate as disclosed by next year skatimates before deciding what amount of detailed explanation it is necessary to give to the Treasury in support of these proposals;

I have the honour to address you in advance with regard to the estimates of the Agricultural Department for 1913-14 and to submit for your favourable consideration certain recommendations relating to additional appointments and increases in existing emoluments for which it is proposed to make provision.

2. The new posts which it is desired to create are as follows:-

(a) A Mycologist at a salary of £500.

rot" in the cocoanut plantations. "rust" in wheat

I am given to understand that the true character. of such fungoid growths can only be properly studied on the spot and that the examination of specimens at the Imperial Institute or elsewhere cannot be absolutely relied upon to give as accurate results as actual investigation in situ. The suggested salary is, I understand, the lowest for which a properly qualified candidate could be obtained. The Director of Agriculture considers this matter so urgent that he presses for the post, if sanctioned, to be filled at once, since delay till the commencement of the financial year 1913-14 might entail such further extension of dispase in the vicinity of the areas suspected to be already affected as would cause a loss quite incommensurate with the small outlay involved. This is particularly the case with Coffee leaf disbase and I should be grateful if in the event of your approval a suitable candidate could be engaged at once, the necessary funds being found from general savings.

(%) An Assistant Entomologist at £250 by

The Entomologist being at present single-handed is often called upon to leave his headquarters in order to investigate some outbreak at a distance and consequently has to abandon experiments

in progress. Centinuous research work is thus rendered impossible and the examination of the life-history of our various insect-pests, which it is very necessary should be studied, cannot be properly carried out. We are thus deprived of the full value of a highly specialized post, as the holder of it cannot combine field work with laboratory investigation, and in order to put an end to the consequent waste of Government money I would strongly recommend the appointment proposed.

(c) Additional Laboratory Assistant - £150 £10 to £180.

The creation of this post in connection with the Veterinary Pathologist's Laboratory at Kabete is urgently needed in order that the production of Anti-Rinderpest serum may proceed without interruption. This serum is being prepared at a much less cost than would be entailed by purchase elsewhere and it is therefore a real economy both to ourselves and the Uganda Protectorate to continue its supply on the present lines.

It is understood that a suitable candidate with experience in the handling of large stock could be procured on the suggested salary from one of the European Serum Laboratories.

(d) Two additional Veterinary Officers at £400

These appointments have already been sanctioned in connection with the increased work resulting from the movement of Masai Stock from Laikipia into the extended Southern Reserve, vide your telegram of August 20th.

(a) One Veterinary Officer at £400 in the place of the Livesteck Inspector.

I am addressing you in a separate despatch on the subject of the transfer of Captain Meave, at present Livestock Inspector, to the Northern Frontier District as Officer in charge of Transport. He is very skilful in the management of animals, particularly camels, but is not a trained Veterinarian, and the suggested employment would therefore probably be more appropriate for him than the post he holds at present.

- 3, All the appointments which I have specified would be unpensionable on agreements for three years, except the two additional Veterinary Officers mentioned in (2), who will probably not be required after the close of the financial year 1913-14,
 - 4. I would venture to recommend the following increases of salary for the holders of existing appointments in the Veterinary Department. The work and responsibilities of these officers grow yearly heavier and more enerous. The stock in the hands of Europeans is increasing rapidly, and a closer supervision is being exercised over native cattle. Outbreaks of disease are frequent and demand unremitting vigilance and attention. Moreover the possibilities of obtaining lucrative private employment are now much greater and if we are to retain men of the right stamp in the service there is no doubt that we must offer them more liberal emoluments than they have received in the past.

It is therefore proposed:

(a) that the Chief Veterthary Officer should be placed on the C.1 Scale, vis:8800-2700 by £25 with duty pay of £60, the first increment to be drawn on April 1st 1914.

(b) that the Deputy Chief Veterinary Officer should be placed on the scale £500 by £20 to £600 with duty pay of £50, the first increment to be also postponed till 1914-15.

(c) that seven Veterinary Officers should after three years probationary service be placed on the permanent staff with salaries on the B Scale viz:£400 by £20 to £500, the first increment being drawn on April 1st 1913.

(d) that Stock Inspectors should be engaged in future for three years at a salary of £200 by £15 to £245 with leave and passage privileges, instead of on monthly agreements as at present. It is very difficult to get suitable men on the existing conditions and they are constantly resigning.

(e) that the Veterinary Pathologist be reengaged for three years at a salary of £600 by 25 £50 to £700. I sincerely trust that this may be sanctioned. Mr. Montgomery is a most valuable officer and I am apprehensive that we may lose his services if the proposed increase of salary is not granted to him.
