As to Bharucha and Dattatreya it is known that their app't. date from some time between August 1906 and 31 Jan/1908, but the exact date cannot be ascertained.

I do not think that Mr. Minen has made out a strong case for the grant of these gratuities which he proposes for the clerks lately employed in the Baroda Agency.

Has they entered Government Service in a first instance in circumstances in which they could have looked forward to prospect of permanent employment, there would be strong ground for paying them gratuities on their posts being abolished ; but, will

In exception of the attempt to have a Head Clerk post made permanent, it seems  
others to have been anticipated that  
the Agency, though as then existing, should  
be considered as a permanent institution,  
and accordingly in April 1908 the Treasury laid  
down "that Mr. Simpson should continue  
to hold such desk as he may require on  
a non-permanent basis out of his rate  
for clerical assistance".

There can, I think, be little doubt that  
the temporary nature of the posts was  
a factor which was <sup>but</sup> considered when  
the rates of salary were originally fixed,  
and it is but in any case it seems  
clear that the posts were always regarded  
as temporary.

This being so it seems undesirable  
except in <sup>my</sup> special circumstances, such  
as long service, to admit such  
claims & facilities.

The Head Clerk has had less than 10 years service.  
His salary was raised in 1906 from R120  
to R130 per annum, and in 1908 to R140  
with a 10% allowance. It seems highly  
improbable that the addition of his post  
203  
has thrown him permanently out of competition  
as Mr. Simpson is "convinced he would have  
little difficulty in obtaining an appointment  
in India at considerably higher pay" (R150).  
However this is an feature about his case  
which deserves notice, that he was a clerk  
in the Agency from its inception in January  
1899, till its abolition in 1912. In addition,  
Mr. Simpson speaks highly of his qualifications.  
He says third and fourth clerks have had  
considerably less service, and have benefited  
by the allowances (15%, 20% and 25% respectively)  
granted in 1908. There does not appear to  
be any reason for granting them a gratuity.
