The Italian Ambassador presents his compliments to
His Britannic Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign
Affairs and has the honour to make the following observations:

The Italian Consul-General at Mombasa has reported to the Italian Government that, as a result of the boycott declared by the native population against Italian shipping, the Steamship "Etruria" of the Societa Nazionale dei Servizii Marittimi was unable to touch at the port of Lamu last December and was unable either to carry on commercial operations or disembark or embark passengers at the port of Kisimayo.

Since the boats of the Societa Nazionale dei Servizii Marittimi run a regular service on that coast, the
Italian Government express the hope that the British
Government will send the necessary instructions to the
proper authorities at Lamu and Kisimayo in order that
these difficulties, which are not compatible with
liberty of commerce, may be prevented from recurring.
