Sir,

In reply to Mr. Read's letter of the 23rd ultimo (2616/1912) relative to the salary of the additional post of Assistant Engineer sanctioned in Treasury Letter of 25th January last (21636/11) for the staff of the Uganda Railway, I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that the object of Their proposal was not to reduce the number of posts carrying the higher scale of £300-500 which will still remain at two, although one of the holders will be employed on the Busoga branch - but to apply the lower scale of £300-450 to the new post now sanctioned. The effect of this will be to secure a staff of two Assistant Engineers at £300-500 and two at £300-450 (in addition to the post at present at £300 fixed) instead of three at the higher and one at the lower scale, as proposed.

As my Lords attach importance to the preservation of the higher scale. They trust you will give the matter your reconsideration, Mr. Harcourt will be pleased to receive your views on the subject.
