My dear Anderson,

I have again looked into the question of Belfield's salary. In writing as we did we were fully aware of the difference in the duties of the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate from those of the Governors of Uganda or Nyasaland and we intended to mark the difference by the grant of a duty allowance of £1000 per annum, to which you make no reference in your letter to me of yesterday. In the Foreign days to which you allude, none of the posts in question carried duty allowance and the concession we have made in this respect has had the effect of increasing by nearly fifty per cent. the emoluments of the East African Government (except as regards title to pension) as compared with those times.

I did not realise, however, that Belfield's age precludes him from qualifying for Governor's pension and this fact appears to me to justify some special concession in his case. I still think that a salary of £3000 in addition to

that the districts of Urundi and Ruanda have a population of about four millions and possess about 500,000 cattle and two million sheep and goats; the soil is also suitable for agriculture and the district is particularly fitted by its cool climate for settlement by Europeans.

The exports of Ruanda amounted in 1910 to 1½ million Marks, the greater part of which was carried by the Uganda Railway.

The Northern Railway of German East Africa which at present goes as far as Moschi, would, if continued to Aruscha, open up the populous and fertile country in the neighbourhood of the Meru Mountain.

Your Excellency:-

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Your Excellency's note, dated the 11th October last, regarding the proposed radiotelegraphic communication between Jumbo and Mombasa.

His Majesty's Government have not yet finally decided what apparatus shall be installed at Mombasa, but they presume that, having regard to Article 21 of the Radiotelegraphic Convention of July 5th, 1912, the Italian Stations will be willing to communicate with the station at Mombasa whatever system is adopted at the last named place.

His Majesty's Government would be glad if the Italian Government could make arrangements that the Jumbo station should be in a position to exchange telegrams directly with the Mombasa Station and serve as an intermediary for telegraphic correspondence be-

between the Wireless Stations in the Benadir Colony and such places as can be conveniently served by circulation via Mombasa.

It is intended that the attendance at the Mombasa Station should extend over the whole twenty-four hours, i.e. the station will always be open to send or receive messages.

The Tariff proposed (i.e. credits required by the Government of the East Africa Protectorate) in respect of traffic between the East Africa Protectorate and Uganda on the one side, and the Benadir Colony on the other side, is fifty centimes per word for the combined wireless and landline services. His Majesty's Government would have pleasure in admitting Italian Government messages at half rates if a similar concession were made by the Italian Authorities in respect of British Government messages.

The Government of the East Africa Protectorate are anxious to proceed with the work of installation as soon as possible, and I have the honour to ask Your

Excellency

Excellency to be good enough to inform me at what date it will be possible for the Italian Government to establish the communication proposed between Jumbo and Mombasa.
