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Mr. HARCOURT: In accordance with the agreement of the 20th of April, 1913, the text of which is given in the Paglia-mentary Paper (CZ, 5684), a considerable number of the Masai have already moved, not northwards as stated in my hon. Friend's question, but into the country as saide for them in the south, and I believe that a few more use moving southwards at the present time. I understand that no presente of any-kind has been exercised by the Administration. The lands to which they are not not the superior to those comprised in the Northern Reserve-They also cover a larger area.

Mr. T. E. HARVEY: In view of the very serious loss of life, that scentral during the reground of part of the Massa South, will the right hot. Centleman give an undertaking that the remainder who are in the Northern territory will not be removed until Parliment hea had an onportunity, of discussing the matter.

Mr. HARCOURT: Parrament did discus the matter last autumn, and I do not think there is anything that could be usefully added to the discussion we had then.

Mr. T. E. HARVEY: to the right hon-Gentleman aware that the loss of life that occurred was very scrious. Has he not usen a photograph shaving sheltens on the roadside along the route which these unfortunate W. r took in moving south?

Ms. HARCOURT. The loss of life was considerably less than that which usually occurs when the Massi move from one part of the country to another. I have seen the photograph. It shows only the skeleton of one woman, and, as the hon, Member must be aware, the Massi do not bury their dead, and it is therefore easy to discover the skeletons of those who die on the road.

Mr. T. E. HARVEY: Will the right hon. Gentleman send for further Papers showing what investigation was made into the loss of life?

Mr. HARCOURT: If there is any further information that can be of use I shall be pleased to give it to the House.

Sir WILLIAM BYLES: Does the right hon. Gentleman expect to have an opportunity of discussing the matter with the Governor of the province?
