I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Lambert's letter of the 20th instant (28955/1912) and its accompanying copy of a letter from the Postmaster General of East Africa on the subject of the two posts of "probationer" postal clerk for which provision is made in the Estimates of the East Africa Protectorate, for the current financial year.

In reply I am to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that in the circumstances represented My Lords agree that these appointments should be made permanent and pensionable on a scale of £130 per annum rising by £8 annually to £160 per annum.
