The objection, as I understand it, is to the
printing of the Rules under the 1909 Act as if they
were applicable. They are very complicated and their
complexity is due to the provision for death gratuities
and gratuity + pension on retirement, which provision
is not, I believe, in force in East Africa.

I think any officer reading the pamphlet would
either form the impression that the U.K. arrangements
applied to him or would be completely mystified.

If it is necessary to explain how pensions or
gratuities for mixed service are to be apportioned
(which is a matter that does not really concern the
officers) it could probably be done quite satisfactorily
by quoting the rules that were in force before these
1909 rules came on the scene.
