Dear Bottomly,

I have examined the E.A.P. map scale 1:1,500,000 which you sent me. It is undoubtedly based on our map but so many alterations and deletions have been made that I fear it would be impossible for us to correct the plates and print a revised edition of our map. Also it would appear that the Survey Department do not require so much detail as is shown on our map as they have left out a large amount, possibly for the sake of clearness. Under these circumstances the only alternatives are to get it reproduced de novo either at the Ordnance Survey or by an outside firm. The Crown Agents have already got an estimate for its reproduction by the Ordnance Survey. There are two or three minor points which I have noted about the map which I enclose on a separate paper but I do not know if you think that they are of importance. I am sorry that there has been so much trouble over this map, but it is probably

probably due to the fact that this is the first map the Survey Department have asked to be reproduced elsewhere. All their maps have hitherto been done here. We shall of course have no responsibility for the new map.

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General Plan.

Boundaries.

(1) Abyssinian Boundary.

This as shown is a mixture of Major Gwynn's proposed boundary and a suggested boundary of 1900.

I do not know whether this is the latest idea of the boundary, but if so we have heard nothing of it.

(2) German Boundary.

This, unless recently altered, should run along the eastern and northern shore of Lake Jipe and not through it.

(3) Uganda Boundary.

This agrees with a sketch map of the Eastern Province of Uganda, dated May 1911, but does not agree with the sketch map by Mr Ainsworth which accompanied the Description of the boundary sent by the Governor in his despatch No. 126 of 8th March 1910. Perhaps this has also been altered since but we have not been informed of it.
