The primary object of the low power
station at Mombasa was to provide quite
~~com~~^{convenient}, via the Italian wireless stations
on the Anglo-Italian frontier with our
posts along the Tana River; I understand
that the Italians have a low power
station at Gumbi near Kisima & a
high power station at Mogadishu some
730 miles further up the coast, & that
there is ~~com~~^{convenient} between the two places.
It appears however that a high-power station
at Gumbi would in ~~any case~~ be
unable to communicate with the low-power
station at Gumbi & that, owing to
the comparatively short distance of 500 miles
~~com~~^{convenient}
between Nairobi & Mogadishu, it could only
be maintained at great inconvenience between
the two latter places, as the power would
have to be brought down to make connexion
between places separated by a few hundred miles.
Proceed as proposed?



Sir,

I have the honour to enclose herewith for your information a copy of a letter from the Italian Commissario Regionale at Giumbo to the British Commissioner of the Province of Jubaland embodying information which I had asked that the latter would be so good as to obtain regarding the Wireless Telegraph Stations in the Italian Colony of the Benadir.

2. The information conveyed may possibly be of interest in view of the projected British Wireless Station at Mombasa, which it is intended should communicate with the Italian Wireless Station at Giumbo. The position of the latter is indicated by a rough marginal sketch.

Monsieur le Commissaire,

en répondant à Vos lettres au sujet de notre service radio-télégraphique entre la Somalie italienne et l'Italie, j'ai l'honneur de Vous communiquer ce que suit:

I). Le tarif par mot de Giumbo (et, également, d'une quelconque des stations R.T. de la Somalie italienne) est de francs 2,60.

2). Les dépêches arrivent ordinairement en Italie le jour suivant à leur présentation au bureau de Giumbo.

En attendant que la Station de Massaua soit en condition de pouvoir communiquer directement par radio-télégraphie avec Coltano, la transmission de Massaua en Italie se fait à présent via Kassala, Hafsa, Alexandrie, Malta: ou bien via Kassala, Suakin, Suez. Pour le moment, la Station de Massaua est en condition de pouvoir recevoir directement de Coltano les dépêches radio-télégraphiques.

3). Le personnel de toutes les Stations R.T. de la Somalie italienne et de la Colonie Eritree est militaire, et appartient aux Semaphoristes de la Royale Marine de guerre. Il est aux ordres d'un Lieutenant de Vaisseau, qui demeure à Mogadiscio.

Le montage de la station de grande puissance de Mogadiscio et de toutes les autres stations de la Somalie à été exécuté entièrement par le personnel de la Royale Marine. Le personnel de la station de Mogadiscio se compose de 12 militaires de Marine, qui sont chargés de tous les travaux techniques, de la conduite et de la maintenance des appareils et des machines, de la manutention des tours, etc.

- 4). Les conditions du sol et atmosphériques de Mogadiscio étaient les plus mauvaises qu'on puisse craindre. Mais on est réussi à vaincre toutes les difficultés, en manière de pouvoir communiquer avec Massua toutes les heures de jour et de la nuit, dans toutes les conditions atmosphériques, même les plus défavorables.
- 5). On peut transmettre jusqu'à No. 500 mots en 25 minutes.
- 6). La station de Mogadiscio dispose de 110 Kilowats.
- 7). Elle est activée par un moteur Diesel de 180H.
- 8). Le système des fils aériens est suspendu à 8 tours de l'hauteur de mètres 70.

En modification de ma lettre No. 2053 du 19 décembre 1911, j'ai l'honneur et le plaisir de Vous informer que, dans le but d'obliger le Gouvernement de British-East Africa, la Station R.T. de Giumbo a été autorisée à accepter les télégrammes directement pour l'Etranger.

In reply to your letter 87243 of the 28th Mar, I am etc to request you forward, for the info of the S.M.L., copies of corrs as noted in the margin, from which it will be seen that the question of establishing a low power wireless station at Mombasa has been postponed, pending the decision of the question whether

whether a high power
station should be erected
in British E. Africa as
part of the Imperial
Wireless Chain.

2. If Nairobi is
ultimately selected as the
site for a H high power
station, Mr. Stascott
presumes, that such a
station would not
interfere with the
suggested low power station
at Mombasa, ~~and that~~
~~the erection~~ of the latter
station would still be
required for local
communication with the
places mentioned in the
enclosed despatch from
the Acting Governor.

3. I am to enquire
whether the P.M.G. concurs
in these views.
