Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 9th instant No. 5872, I am directed by the Postmaster General to acquaint you for the information of the Secretary of State that Mr. Cathcart Wason M.P. has given notice that the following question will be asked in the House of Commons on Tuesday the 29th instant:-

"To ask the Postmaster General, whether, in view of the fact that there is a direct loss to the Post Office of £7,200 a year by the contract for the conveyance of mails from Aden to Mombasa, and that the said service is of no value for either passengers or for trade, he will take into consideration the desirability of terminating the contract, with a view to secure a service that will be of some advantage to the commerce of East Africa".

The Postmaster General would be glad to learn what observations the Secretary of State has to offer on this question, and what answer he would wish given to it so far as the service is to be regarded as performed for other than Post Office purposes.

The value of the service for purely Post Office purposes is not estimated at £1800 a year. It has, of course, always been recognised by this Office that the conveyance of mails was only a small part of the considerations for the maintenance of the service.

The contract with the British India Steam Navigation Company has not yet been completed, as there are still some questions under consideration in regard to the exactation of penalties in connexion with some of the early voyages under the existing arrangement. From the enclosed copy of the draft contract it will be seen that the contract will be held to have commenced on the 22nd of February 1909, and that it is now terminable at any time by six months' notice.

The service has been performed substantially in accordance with the terms of the draft contract, with the exception that owing to an accident to one of their ships the Company were forced to commence the service under the new arrangement with a ship of less speed than is contemplated and that the arrival at Mombasa was consequently several hours late on the first three outward voyages. ~~under the~~ It is questionable also whether the period between which the monsoon allowance is granted to the Company should not be revised to a slight extent so as to fall more exactly within the period in which the monsoon prevails.

Further communications shall be sent to you on these points, and also in connexion with the call at Lamu referred to in your letter of the 6th of January last, No. 69395/09.
