I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd. instant, the contents of which I have duly noted, and to thank you for the allowance of a free passage home.

I observe that pay has been granted up to the 15th. ultimo, whereas it was not until the 16th. that I arrived in England.

I have therefore the honour to request you to be good enough to substitute the latter date in my pay sheet and at the same time to grant me sick leave on half-pay for a brief period pending my discharge from hospital and the consideration of my name in respect of any suitable vacancy elsewhere than in the E. A. P.

I hope shortly to present myself at your office in this connection.

In conclusion, I would respectfully tender my sincere thanks for all that has been done in my behalf since I entered Mombasa Hospital, though still adhering to the opinion I then and subsequently expressed that such care was unnecessary.
