Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 22nd ultimo, No. 33106/1912, and to previous correspondence, respecting the vacancies for three Male Postal Clerks and Telegraphists in British East Africa and Uganda, I am directed by the Postmaster General to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that the vacancies have been brought to the notice of officers of this Department qualified for the posts.

The most suitable candidates are Mr. H.F. Eglon, age 29, Mr. J. Youll, age 24, Sorting Clerks and Telegraphists at Leicester and Whitehaven respectively, and Mr. G. Sharp, age 26, Telegraphist, Central Telegraph Office, London. They have a thorough knowledge of postal work and are good telegraphists. They are unmarried.

The Postmaster General assumes that Mr. Secretary Harcourt is prepared to give, in respect of the three appointments in question, the undertakings mentioned in the letter from this Office of the 25th of October 1911, No. 532067/10; and, in the circumstances, he will make arrangements for the officers selected to be seconded for a period not exceeding three years.

Sir,

I am directed by Mr. Secretary Harcourt to inform you that, subject to your being passed as physically fit for service, he proposes to select you for appointment as a Postal Clerk and Telegraphist in the East Africa and Uganda Postal and Telegraph Department with salary at the rate of £130 per annum rising by annual increments of £8 to £160 per annum. Government quarters free of rent (but not of rates or other similar outgoings) are provided for single men when such quarters are available. When such quarters are not available, a hut or other temporary shelter

shelter is provided, or in certain cases an allowance in lieu of quarters is granted at the discretion of the Government. Free second class passages are provided to and from East Africa. Half pay is granted as from the date of leaving England and full pay as from the date of arrival at Mombasa.

2. A memorandum, showing the general conditions attached to appointments in East Africa and a copy of the leave and passage regulations for civil officers are enclosed herewith, but you are to understand that you will be subject to any regulations which may hereafter be introduced by or with the sanction of the Secretary of State. A copy of the regulations as to pensions and a copy of the Colonial Regulations are also enclosed.

3. You will be seconded in the first instance in the Home Service for a tour of thirty-months in East Africa and the leave incidental thereto, on the understanding that the period of your seconding (including passages and leave as well as the time spent in East Africa) shall not exceed three years. At the end of that period (provided that your services have been satisfactory) it will be open to you to remain permanently in Colonial employment or to revert to the Home Service.

4. If you are prepared to accept the appointment ^{on} these conditions, you should present yourself to one of the Medical Advisers to this Department whose names are given on the enclosed letter for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be left with

with him, and he will send his report direct to this Department. The fee for the examination will be paid by the Government.

5. I am to request that you will inform me as soon as possible whether you wish to accept this offer. You should also inform me what is the earliest date on which you will be able to leave for East Africa where your services are urgently required.

6. At the same time you should furnish me with an address to which communications intended for your relatives or friends can be sent during your absence from this country.

7. A copy of "Notes for Officers appointed to East Africa and Uganda" is enclosed.
