My former appointment in the East African Protectorate came to a conclusion only because the particular work upon which I was engaged i.e. the furtherance of Cotton growing as an industry was passed on to the British Cotton Growing Association.

The report on "The possibilities of Cotton Growing" was favourably received, and I received the thanks of the Government and of the High Commissioner at the time.

I was thereafter engaged by a company formed to take up the work of Cotton growing in East Africa and have since been planting Rubber and Coconuts etc there receiving a share in the business plus the small salary of £250 per annum and travelling allowance which however I think is insufficient remuneration and am therefore desirous of securing a better appointment.

work as his sojourn here has been a marked success.


His power of organization and development must be of
