on C.R. we approved of the lease to Lord Cranworth of 2000 acres on West Kenya, with the option of taking up another 2000 acres. This letter evidently refers to some quite different proposition. Girouard mentioned that Lord Cranworth had applied for a concession on the southern and eastern slopes of Mount Kenya, but sent no details of the application. acres.

After further conversations this was raised

to 100,000 acres on the N.W. of the

It is understood that the matter is in


