Sir,

Plantations (Mol) - East Africa Protectorate.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 36212/1912 dated the 19th inst.

(2) I beg to inform you that I am quite satisfied with the reports which I have received as to the prohibition of the recruiting of Kikuyu Labour are correct. My suggestion, therefore, that you should telegraphically inquire into this matter was made in order that you might satisfy yourself as to the correctness of these reports.

(3) The point upon which I am anxious is that the prohibition should be suspended as set out in paragraph 4 of my letter of the 16th inst.

(4) If you can see your way to act in accordance with this suggestion, I am prepared to defray the cost of cabling to that effect, because, as I have already had the honour of informing you, I regard the prohibition of the recruiting of the Kikuyu labour as a disastrous blow to the Planting Industry.

(5) Should you feel unable to direct a general suspension of this Prohibition, may I ask if you will do so in the case of this
