Sir,

I have to acknowledge your letter of August 7th and to apologise for the delay in doing so. My excuse is that I have been travelling and had not my file of the correspondence with me.

The memorandum, a copy of which you enclose, was sent to me for confirmation on March 6th 1912. On March 26th I replied as follows:

The Acting Chief Secretary, Nairobi.  
Sir,

On my return to Nairobi I have this day received your letter of March 6th No. S. 283 Vol. 8. The précis of the discussion is correct except that in line three of paragraph 2 the word "part" should be read as "pact", and that the end of paragraph 4 should read "and it proved the principle of the division of the land as shown thereon whereby the M'koriki portion of the division is to be leased to him".

The plan of the land which I return herewith, only suffices to illustrate the principle of the Agreement. It did not suffice to delimit finally the actual boundaries because the Government had informed me that it did not in fact own some of the land which had been allotted to me.

The details of the final adjustment of this question were the matter of separate subsequent correspondence of which I have no copies here.

The principles however as between myself and the Government were agreed and the final settlement depends upon local adjustment of boundaries among various claimants which await the sitting of the Land Court.

With reference to paragraph 2 of your letter: in a communication addressed by me to The Honble. The Crown Advocate under date of April 16th 1912 I defined my position in the following terms, "In the matter of 'method of royalty payment' I rely upon Clause 5 of the Provisional Agreement accepted by The Secretary of State in a letter dated February 10th 1911 whereby it is agreed that 'the forestal conditions of the license shall be such as may be agreed upon by Mr. Grogan and the Chief Conservator of Forests'".

The memorandum of agreement re method of royalty payment between myself and the Chief Conservator, which was drafted and typed in the Forest Office, provides that "milled timber" shall be the basis of royalty payment.

For the reasons expressed at the meeting of July 26th last I am unwilling to accept an alteration of this principle, but I would welcome any reasonable system of checks which the Protectorate Government might devise provided that it is clearly laid down that such checks are only to apply to the protection of the Government against any evasion by me or my agents of the royalties payable on "the cubic contents of the serviceable sawable timber in the bole" which is Mr. Hutchins' definition of the basis of calculation from which the agreed formula of conversion was deduced.
