Mr Soling is only concerned in this  
letter with the male "probationary"  
postal clerks, as the female  
clerk's apps. have been made  
permanent, though for a limited  
time.

I entirely agree with Mr Soling's  
contention that our probationary  
clerks (2 in number) should  
be permanent & pensionable  
at £130 - £160 but the  
question of increments must  
be

be covered. The present permanent  
apts. cost increments of £8 in sale  
£160 - £200. If these permanent  
have increments of £100, & if  
made permanent, the probationers  
increments should be the same  
as those of the other clerks.

I am bound to consult the  
Salar. who would undoubtedly  
support Mr. Gosling's proposal.

Sir:

With reference to the third and fourth paragraphs of the Colonial Office letter No 21764/1r addressed to the Secretary General Post Office on the 27th of July regarding the appointment of two male & one female postal clerks and telegraphist for East Africa, I have the honor to inform you that after discussing the general question of the male appointment with the authority of Dr. Martin le Grand I consider it desirable that these posts should be made feminable.

The male clerical staff (including) of the Post Office of East Africa Uganda is divided into two classes.

(a) Probationers - non-honorable - with  
commencement salaries of £130 p.a. & £15.  
Honorable despatch with commencing salaries  
of £160 p.a. Office of class 1A were  
formerly despatch from South Africa or  
from Consulate having themselves  
locally, but the class so recruited  
were not altogether satisfactory and  
about a year ago the experiment was  
made of obtaining two offices for the  
(probationary) I grade from the British  
Post Office. In view of the fact that  
the appointment was not honorable  
I suggested that it would be better to  
select consuls from the established  
staff.

3. The result of the advertisement of  
the vacancies by the British Post Office  
- about a year since - was to show  
that practically every office who was  
willing to accept some in East Africa  
& whose qualification reached the standard  
required had - presumably as a result  
of his attaining to their qualifications  
- already obtained an established  
appointment. A few thus found  
demonstrated was that established  
officers

Office of an expense & liability  
compatible with that furnish'd  
for the £160 grade more candidate  
for discharge on the lower (Post)  
scale. The two appointments were  
eventually given to Mr. Weston  
& Mayes, established clerks of about 26  
years of age, who sacrificed their  
hension rights in order to accept them.

4. During the past few months the  
question of pension rights in respect  
of these lower scale posts has again  
been raised on the appointment of Mr.  
Mois & who was an established  
(permanent) officer serving at the And  
Post Office. A reference to the Colonial  
Affairs paper quoted in the margin  
will show that his services throught  
were made pensionable in consideration  
of his former pensionable wife  
in England.

5. Suitable candidate from the  
non-honorable staff of the Post  
Office are apparently not forth-  
coming. & after carefully considering the

the matter I am of opinion that it would be of great help to my Department of these probationary officers and with commencing salaries of £100 per annum pension rights in the manner one of officers who had honourable & meritorious service, who should be seconded from the British Post Office during their initial term of service in South Africa. We should probably get a better class of men than has formerly been recruited for these posts & the financial effect would be to reduce the initial salaries of those officers to £90 per annum, or even in the £100 class works to be filled by promotion from the lower grade. This would lead to fairly rapid promotion which would tend towards a contented staff. On the other hand the alternative of allowing established posts of the British Post Office to seek their honorable service in order to obtain employment in South Africa would, I fear, certainly lead to agitation & discontent.
