W.D. Read.

W.D. Read asked to place briefly on record that he saw W.D. Killingsbeck on Friday 2nd August.

W.D. K. showed W.D. Read a letter he had drafted of which the gist, W.D. Read said, was that if W.D. K. had been given access to certain documents, he could have proved his original contributions.

W.D. Read then went through most of the charges summarised in the last and last are to the despatch on 17/34/12 - pointing out that they were such that his number of documents could make any difference.

The matter had been carefully gone into by W.D. Hollis & W.D. Lamb, neither of whom was biased against W.D. K. Inquiries at the C.O. also the matter had been carefully examined.

In reply to a request from W.D. K. that C.O. letter of 11/June on 17/34/12 might be modified, W.D. Read said that he could not hold out any prospect that this would be done. He advised W.D. K. to go back to G.O. and try to work in smoothly, both for his own sake and other people's.

Incidentally, W.D. K. enquired whether W.D. Read found him deaf, as he could hear all right that W.D. Read was saying. W.D. Read replied that he was speaking very loudly. I should agree myself with G.P. Thompson's report that conversations - especially with W.D. K.

Sir,

With reference to your letter No. 20107/12 of the 3rd instant, I have the honour to inform you that Sir Patrick Manson duly examined me on Thursday last, his report on the examination is probably now with you.

(2) I shall again be in London on Monday next and it will be much appreciated if the privilege of an interview with Mr H. J. Read can then be accorded me. I desire to see Mr Read in connection with your letter no. 17134/12 of the 11th ultimo and other matters. I feel that the representations therein conveyed in your letter seriously affect not only my official career but also my honour and I therefore press for a considerate hearing which has not been accorded me in East Africa.

(3) Should Mr Read be out of town or otherwise engaged, may I be permitted an interview with Mr Bertram Cox, who, I believe, is Legal Adviser to the Colonial Office and to whom perhaps, in the event of the desired interview meeting with your approval, the full papers in connection with this case may be submitted.
