

I have to acknowledge with thanks the receipt of your letter of the 10th. inst., and note that I shall hear further in reply to mine of the 8th. inst.

My object, however, in writing to-day, is to inform you that I have just received a proposal to take over one of the 10,000 acre plots of land referred to in the Agreement dated February 2nd. 1910 between the Crown Agents for the Colonies and Mr. Poultney, from a Company lately formed called the Anglo East African Rubber Plantations Ltd., which already owns and is working, land in the Protectorate under leases granted by the Government.

This Company requires additional land near Malindi, now in order to carry out its development strictly in accordance with the terms set forth in the Agreement above referred to, and will enter into a contract accordingly.

It is therefore all the more urgent that the request contained in my letter of the 8th. inst. be granted at the earliest possible moment so that I may take advantage of the offer received and retrieve this business from the unfortunate position in which it has been placed through the failure of Mr. Poultney to carry out his obligations.

I may mention that on the land is entirely undeveloped at present, the proposed purchase price is practically solely shares in the Anglo East African Rubber Plantations, Ltd. but these I am willing to accept on behalf of Lady Mackenzie and her friends, knowing that the Company has the means to develop the land properly, and intends to do so if it

takes it over.

I have been asked to give my decision as soon as possible as other land has been offered the Company, but I cannot do this until I know I have your authority to deal with the Concession which Lady Mackenzie allowed to be placed in Mr. Foulkes' name under the belief that he would fulfil his contract with her to form and float a Company to develop the whole 20,000 acres granted through her medium.

I propose to retain the remaining 10,000 acres for disposal at the earliest opportunity to other persons interested in the Colony, purpose with whom I am now in negotiation, and for which I may probably go out to East Africa within the next two or three months.

With regard to the right granted in Section 3, Clause 12 of the beforementioned Agreement, to construct a light railway from the lands to the Port of Mombasa, I am anxious to know whether such powers will remain in force and be transferred later on when I have completed arrangements to exercise them for the benefit of the district.

Regarding this whole matter, I can only say that if it be replaced in the position in which it was prior to the granting of the lands under the Agreement of February 18th, last, I shall be able to deal with it in a manner satisfactory to the Colonial Office and to those friends of Lady Mackenzie who provided the funds to enable Mr. Foulkes put to select the land on their behalf.
