With reference to your despatch No. 692
of the 23rd of October, I have the honour to report that further enquiries into the reason for the loss of eye-sight of Mr. V. S. Dravid, 4th Grade Postal Clerk, have elicited the fact that this infliction was not wholly, nor even primarily attributable to the nature of his work, though it was undoubtedly aggravated by his retention at his post when unfit for duty.

2. I regret therefore that he would not appear eligible for a gratuity under Section 1 of the Superannuation Act, 1887.
