① As regards cost of living - the following figures from E.T.O. handbook on East & Uganda:-

Tea 2/- per lb.	2/- per lb.

Beef 3/- 4/- per lb.	" never exceed 5/- per lb."
Eggs 1/- each	a. European - 9/- for 4/4 b. Native - 1/- to 1 1/2/- each.

The general result of these chance figures is that Col. living is cheaper than living in Uganda, but very slightly so. And further, travelling all in S.A. has been fixed at R5, medium as against R4 in Uganda. The reason given being that living in Uganda is cheaper - probably, a safe general statement will be that imported food stuffs are dearer in Uganda than in Col., but native produce cheaper.

On the whole, I think that we should not admit the claim for increased salary on the ground of living expenses, any more than on the ground of climate.
