I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 126 of the 15th of February respecting the amount due by Sir Percy Girouard on account of rent of furniture in Government House during his term of office as Governor of this Protectorate, and in accordance with your instructions to offer my observations on the points raised by him.

2. The attic bedrooms were first brought into use in August 1910. The accounts have been amended and at the same time amplified to show more clearly the dates from which the charges are made. The rooms above the office were occupied by the Aide-de-Camp and Private Secretary from the 1st of April 1910.

3. The charges for kitchen furniture and utensils

utensils have not been deleted as it has been the usual practice in the past to include them, and the articles in question are required every day for the personal use of the Governor and his suite.

4. The furniture of the boudoir is not shown separately as this room is merely a portion of the upper hall cut off by a partition.

5. The Groom's cottage was originally erected for and occupied for a short time by Sir Percy's coachman, but as no information is available as to the date on which his services terminated the charge has been withdrawn.

6. I transmit herewith two accounts, one based on the ruling given in paragraph 3 of your despatch and the other on the opinion of the Director of Colonial Audit that bedrooms reserved for the accommodation of official visitors are not to be charged for, and I would suggest that one of the accounts with its relative ruling be withdrawn on a final interpretation of Colonial Office Regulation 389 being arrived at.

7. I am taking steps to effect the introduction of an annual payment for these charges.


