I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 392 of 22nd instant reporting the occurrence of four cases of cattle theft perpetrated by certain members of the Lumbwa tribe on Kavirondo and others and to inform you that a case of theft of a similar nature from the Veterinary Quarantine Camp at Fort Ternan has recently taken place.

2. The main features of this latter case are almost identical with and bear considerable resemblance to those referred to above, in so far as they relate to the apathy shewn and the lack of assistance rendered by members of the tribe.

3. The total loss of cattle with their approximate value amounts to:-

- 3 cows
- 3 heifers
- 3 bulls.

Total value Rs. 575/-. These were traced into the Lumbwa
