Sir

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter N^o 37441/10 which has been forwarded to me by the Colonial Office today, in which you offer me the appointment of Acting Collector at Pemba under the Zanzibar Government for a period of 2 years. I shall be obliged if I may be supplied with information as to the following before replying.

(1) How soon is the appointment to be taken up?

I am at present on 6 months leave of absence from the East Africa Protectorate and am not due at Mombasa until February 9th.

(2) The cost of my passages from this country to Zanzibar and from Zanzibar to East Africa on the termination of my appointment would be borne by the Zanzibar Gov^t, according to your letter. My health would probably require however that I should take leave of absence to England after two years residence in Pemba and the Government of the East Africa Protectorate would presumably pay my passage home and grant me leave of absence upon the usual rates of pay immediately upon my return.

Under Secretary of State

return to the Protectorate from Pemba.

Would the Zanzibar Government be prepared to pay my passage home and give me four months' leave after twenty ^{months} ~~years~~ service.
