ORDER No. 43.

**PREVENTION OF THEFTS OF CASH FROM STATION  
SAFES AND CASH BOXES.**

With a view to the prevention of thefts of Cash from Station Subsidiary Safes and Cash Boxes in future, the attention of District Commissioners and their Assistants, who are Sub-accountants, is drawn to Chapter V of the Colonial Office Regulations governing Finance.

2. In cases therefore where a subordinate official is allowed the control of cash for daily disbursements, the amount of such cash should not exceed the normal daily needs, and wherever possible the sum in his hands at the end of the day should be locked up in the Main Safe (i.e. the safe of which the key is held by the Officer in Charge) for custody. This sum should be placed in a bag or tray and, in the presence of the Clerk, deposited in the Main Safe, the necessary amount of cash being handed out to him on the following morning.

3. In cases where an Officer is single handed in a Station and it is necessary for him to be constantly travelling in his district such cash

only as is necessary to meet normal daily needs should be left in charge of a Clerk during the Officer's absence from his station.

4. Please instruct all Officers in your Province accordingly.

When a case is referred to the jurisdiction of a court of law from a District Magistrate or a District Commissioner, the attention of the District Commissioner and their Assistants, who are responsible, is drawn to Chapter 7 of the Criminal Procedure Code, which provides for the appointment of a Magistrate to try the case. In cases where there is a subordinate Magistrate, the attention of such Magistrate is drawn to the normal daily work, and wherever possible the case is tried at the end of the day. It is to be noted that the case is tried in the District Magistrate's court, which is held by the District Magistrate (or his Assistant) in the presence of the District Magistrate. This case should be tried in a way as to get out of the hands of the District Magistrate as early as possible. In cases where an Assistant Magistrate is appointed in a District and it is necessary for him to be constantly travelling in his district such cases should be referred to him on the following morning.
