I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your secret despatch of May 22nd, 1913, covering copies of communications from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and from H. M. Minister at Adis Ababa regarding the political situation in Abyssinia.

- of affairs as is foreshadowed in these documents, I apprehend that the principal and probably the only precaution necessary in order to secure the interests of this Protectorate would be the efficient safe-guarding of the Frontier from incursions from the Abyssinian side. It would not be possible to effect this by means of the forces at my disposal, as they would probably be fully occupied at such a juncture in maintaining order smoog our own tribes.
- 3. Commercial relations between Abyspinia and this sountry are at present in so expository a stage that it is improbable that the interests of our trading community would be aeriqualy affected by their temporary dispontinuance.
